FROM THE DEPUTY'S DESK

Year 10 Subject Selections:

The Year 10 into 11 subject selection evening is not until early next term however the process of considering subjects has started this week. All students have been issued with an initial choice sheet. This was not definitive but was meant to stimulate discussion and open enquiries. Year 10 students are encouraged to commence asking questions of Head Teachers and gain knowledge of all subjects. It is also important to consider what level of English and Mathematics that will be undertaken. Placements in these subjects will be influenced by results, those students wishing to be placed in Extension and Advanced courses need to have shown a sound understanding of the subjects throughout. Year 10.students who achieve success in the Higher School Certificate set themselves high but achievable goals.

Year 12 Study Days:

Over the past few weeks the students in Year 12 have had the opportunity to attend study days at Singleton and in Newcastle. Mount View has also organised an internal day. Each of these days has stressed three key elements for success. Students must know their work. At the end of the year the students will be competing with students across the state. Many of these students will have studied hard, asked questions of teachers and read extensively on the topics to be examined. MVHS students will only match students from other schools if they also fully understand their work. Secondly students must be organised. The whole HSC experience can appear to be overwhelming, but it can be confronted confidently if the student is organized and has a balanced approach to the workload. Thirdly, the students need to know what to expect. Each student should be aware of the style of the exam as well as the content. Students should have prepared essays, if appropriate, know how to do multiple choice questions or have a sound idea of the amount of working to show to get marks. Parents are encouraged to discuss the points with the students.



Discipline Review:

Last year the school completed a Discipline Review. One of the recommendations was that regular contact be made with parents about aspects of Discipline within the school. This month I would like to reinforce our card system. Parents and students can request placement on a card to check behaviour and effort. Students may also be placed on cards if the school feels that monitoring would be of value. In either case it is the responsibility of the student to ensure that the card is completed and shown to parents. The card should be signed off each day by each teacher and then viewed by the parent in the evening. Feel free to comment on the back of the card, this is an important communication tool. If you would like further information on the card please contact one of the Deputy Principals.

Sporting Success:

Congratulations to Year 12 student, Montanna Sharpe who has achieved success at the highest level. Montanna has excelled at Hockey for many years, she has represented internationally during her time at Mount View. She was recently selected to play for NSW in the National Championships, the pinnacle of achievement for students. As the goalkeeper for NSW, Montanna was instrumental in assisting the team to reach the semi finals. Because the semi was a draw the match was decided on a penalty shootout. Montanna saved all the shots and enabled the team to advance to the final. Once again she performed exceptionally well enabling NSW to win 4 goals to 2. Students are already planning the purchase and preparation of tantalising products to sell to the school community.

Year 12 Geography students recently undertook a field trip to Newcastle to study the urban growth and renewal of Honeysuckle.

Year 12 Retail students have completed various practical activities in order to meet competencies required for their Certificate 2 in Retail. They have dealt with customer complaints, taken orders over the telephone and shared their product knowledge and selling skills in various role play situations.

Our very own Social Science Head teacher, Mr Bruce Deer is participating in this year's AHA NSW Newcastle Variety Bash (May 20-26) which is a key regional fundraising event for Variety. This year Variety's thrilled to have Australian Hotels Association NSW (AHA NSW) as a sponsor. The Bash is not a race or rally but rather a drive through Central Western NSW where everyone is driving the miles for the smiles. This year's Bash is the biggest yet, with a record number of 200 'Bashers' taking part in 68 weird and wonderful vehicles. This seven-day charity motoring event covers 2333km, beginning in Newcastle travelling to The Entrance and back again, whilst pit stopping at schools to donate equipment on wish lists and delighting the locals along the way.

Last year Bashers raised \$300,000 to help our kids, while this year they have set their sights on raising \$500,000.

Bashers are only permitted to drive pre-1974 cars, typically decked out in novel style and dressed themselves, in the most craziest and outrageous costumes that you can ever imagine. But it's two-wheel drive vehicles only, no omnibuses, motorbikes or motorised wheelbarrows allowed. Bribery and blatant cheating are in fact encouraged as participants vie to complete the course while raising the most funds for the kids, so there's plenty of antics. Aside from the fun and camaraderie the event provides, the Bash is a great opportunity for participants to travel to parts of Australia that they may not otherwise see, at the same time as raising money to support kids in need.

Since its inception in 1992, the Newcastle Bash has achieved a great deal, with \$4,000,000 being raised collectively by the Bashers.

The official launch of the Beacon program into Mount View High School on Friday 1st June 2012 marked an enhanced and fresh commitment to the future of the region's young people.

Already operating in 140 schools across Australia, Beacon aims to work in partnership with the schools, local businesses and the wider Hunter to provide a positive pathway for students outside the school gate.

Typically, the Beacon program is run in schools at year 10 level and relies heavily on local business and industry to support an array of practical hands on programs to inspire and motivate students to stay at school, seek further training or employment, thereby avoiding social welfare.

YEAR 7 & 10 IMMUNISATION DAY Revised date Tuesday 26th June

As part of the free school based vaccination program, the NSW Health team will be back in the school on <u>**Tuesday 26th June 2012**</u>. Immunisations on this day will be:

- All Year 7 & 10 students will receive one dose of the Boostrix (combined Diphtheria-Tetanus-acellular Pertussis dTpa) vaccine.
- Catchup Varicella (chickenpox) vaccine for Year 7 students who were absent on first immunisation day.

Parents should ensure that your child has eaten breakfast the morning of immunisations.

Year 7 parents received these consent forms at the beginning of the year, therefore those who have already returned them we have them safely stored at school.

Year 10 parent consent forms have recently been given to students. To consent to the vaccination of your child, parents/guardians are advised to read all the information provided, complete the consent form.

For parents of Yr 7 & 10 students who haven't yet returned consent forms and who wish for their child to receive this vaccine please ensure the consent form is returned to the School Admin Office prior to <u>15th June 2012</u>. A record of vaccination will be provided to each student vaccinated at the school by NSW Health.

If you do not wish your child to partake in the vaccination program at school we ask that you still return your unsigned consent forms as we are required to return them to NSW Health. If your child is absent from school on this day you will need to follow up this immunisation with your local doctor.

Proposed remaining immunisation dates:

11th September – All Yr 7 students final Hep B & Yr 7 females final HPV (only given to those students who have received previous doses at school)
