PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Changes to school funding were recently announced and you may have seen reference to this in last week's Cessnock Advertiser. The new model of funding is referred to as the Resource Allocation Model (RAM).

I am pleased to announce that Mount View High School has received substantial funding that will allow us to continue the provision of essential academic, and learning, social emotional skills' and extracurricular activities for our students. Our inclusion on the National Partnerships for Low Socio-Economic Status (NPLSES) schools over the past 4 years has seen considerable innovation and has involved rigorous evaluative processes. Taking the recommendations from our NPLSES involvement into account, through our RAM and Improving Literacy and Numeracy National partnership (ILNNP) funding we will be able to, for example:

- continue essential professional development for staff in the explicit teaching of literacy and numeracy
- develop a Literacy and Numeracy Learning Centre to cater for targeted students' further development
- purchase additional resources to support the introduction of the national curriculum which begins implementation on 2014
- maintain the key roles of Business Manager and Community Liaison Officer
- consider the re-employment of an Aboriginal Community Liaison Officer

Planning for 2014 is now in full swing. There will be a number of staff changes over the next 12 - 18 months with some staff reaching well-earned retirement. I have also completed a review of executive roles and responsibilities and some changes will be made in this respect in preparation for the 2014 school year. Some internal changes have also been made on a trial basis to our staff meeting calendar so that additional professional learning time can be made available.

Recently 678 students from our school participated in the Tell Them From Me – NSW Pilot Secondary Schools 2013 Survey. Students in all year groups have given us valuable feedback on a number of factors related to social-emotional and academic outcomes, and school and classroom effectiveness. The results will be thoroughly analysed with feedback going to students, staff and parents shortly. The report has made fascinating reading already!

I hope that you enjoy learning more of the latest happenings at Mount View High School as you read through this edition of The View. We are especially looking forward to you joining us at the end of year Presentation Assemblies; to hearing of the Year 12 students' HSC successes and to seeing our outgoing Year 12 at their formal on Thursday night.



ATTENDANCE

Senior Leave 2013-14

'Senior Leave' is a privilege offered to senior students to optimise the use of their school day. It is a time where students, with the permission of their parents/ guardians, may conduct study activities on or off the school campus. For some, this may involve TAFE, traineeships or private tuition. It may take the form of a 'Late Start' or 'Early Leave'.

During Term 1 and Term 4, there are no 'Late Starts' on a Tuesday as this is assembly morning and ALL students are required to attend. Year meetings occur during roll call and attendance is also compulsory; the new "Year 12" meet Friday Week 1.

'Study Periods' are times where the student has no timetabled period during the course of the day. Students are required to remain on the premises at this time. Students are required to be in the School Library, outdoor Senior Study area, Faculty 'mouse' / study rooms, or with teacher supervision in workshops/ practical classrooms.

All seniors have been issued with this information and should have returned a signed contract to the HT Administration.

Students who have not agreed to the conditions of Senior Leave by returning the signed contract will be expected and required to remain on the premises between the hours of 8.40am and 3pm each day.

The grant has helped with the purchase of 6 more iPads for the Life Skills students. The students use the 'Jungle Coins' and 'I can count AUS' applications to


practice their money handling and financial literacy skills.

SCHOOL ZONE PATROLS

Keep Your Kids Safe, Park In The Right Place



Parents and teachers are reminded that the rangers will be out in force throughout Cessnock to ensure all drivers are parked legally in school zones. Cessnock City Council rangers are reminding all drivers of school children to park safely when transporting their children to and from school. To improve the safety of our children, penalties for many traffic and parking offences in school zones has increased.

Driving and Parking offences in school zones carry higher penalties and also include demerit points. They apply during school zone operational hours of **8.00am** - **9.30am** and **2.30pm** - **4.00pm**. A ranger or authorised officer only has to site a vehicle offence in a school zone to issue a fine to the registered owner of the offending vehicle.



through Aboriginal Education. All of Year 7 attended, along with 15 members of the JAECG/ Indigenous Dance Group and numerous teaching staff.

Fred comes from the Daingattie tribe of North Western NSW, and was separated from his family in the mid 1960's. His mission is to bring about a better understanding of Aboriginal people and their culture. Fred, with the help of his son and partner, delivered his message in a fun way. Fred spoke of the countries that we belong to, the meaning of totems, the importance of respect and numerous other subjects.

Traditional Aboriginal Dance was then demonstrated and male students were invited to come onto the stage and get involved. It was great to see so many of the students on the stage enjoying their involvement in the kangaroo dance.

VIETNAM & CAMBODIA TRIP

Vietnam and Cambodia

During the September/October holidays a group of 13 students and 8 staff from Mount View High School and Belmont High School went to Vietnam and Cambodia. The trip was very successful and the students are to be commended on their behaviour.

The group visited four cities, Vietnam, Hanoi, Hue, Hoi An and Ho Chi Minh City. For the final few days of the trip the group travelled to the city of Siem Riep in Cambodia. Some of the students who attended the trip have written about some of the highlights.

On the first of October our group went to the War Museum in Ho Chi Minh. We saw a great deal of weapons that were used during the Vietnam War and the effect that these weapons had. There were two rooms in the museum specifically on the effects of Agent Orange. Many of these stories were very touching and emotional. Outside the museum there was some of the torture methods used on POW's. These torture methods were cruel and disturbing. The war museum was a highlight of the trip and was a great learning experience.

When you think of Halong Bay you think of a beach with a caravan park close by. However when you're there it is nothing like that. There is no beach just a beautiful view of the rocks. The group went on a boat cruise around Halong Bay and viewed the spectacular scenery. We got off on one of the small islands and visited some beautiful natural caves that had developed inside. Afterwards we enjoyed lunch while we cruised around the bay taking in all of the sights including the odd jellyfish or two.

The markets in Saigon, Ho Chi Minh City provide an insight into the daily workings of family-run enterprises selling a vast range of goods that are "just the thing for you". It is all shopper's dreams in one bustling area, at a negotiable price. Walking through narrow, endless

passageways moving past masses of handbags, jewellery, sunglasses and more sunglasses whilst being continually told to "please buy something" can be confronting and overwhelming. It allows for your eyes to be opened and for you to experience and accept new things and also puts on display the hard-working and dedicated nature of the Vietnamese people and how they strive to be of value to their society.

The Orphange - By Sarah Donn

Whilst travelling through Vietnam, our group visited an orphanage, which was started and still run by a Vietnamese nun. At the beginning of the orphanage visit, the nun told us how she started the orphanage. At first she had no support from the Government so she was forced to set up the orphanage illegally. As time went by, people started to see what good the orphanage did for the children. Support started to increase and is now giving the children who live in the orphanage the chance of a brighter future. The orphanage is now home to approximately 180 children aged from a couple of weeks old to 18 year olds. The children in the orphanage become each others family and they are not adopted. Once the children have finished their schooling they are able to go and work in the community, they are also given the option to stay and work within the orphanage.

After speaking with the nun, we were allowed to interact with the children. We visited the infant section where we saw and held many cute babies. Many of the orphans were at school so we then mingled with the toddlers and students who did not attend school because of disabilities. We talked with the children, took photos and played games, including 'Angry Birds.' All the children who lived at the orphanage were happy with their home and were given the best care that could be offered to them.

While travelling through Vietnam we saw various levels of poverty which particularly affected children. But, after visiting the orphanage, we saw that some people were putting in the effort to give to give those children who would otherwise be forgotten a brighter future.





Cu Chi Tunnels - By Eliza Mackenzie

An hour's bus trip on day 10 lead us to the Cu Chi Tunnels. On arrival, we were greeted by a Vietnamese war veteran who shared us stories about the experiences of war and life in the tunnels. After the veteran's fascinating words, we were lead deep into the bushland and shown one of the many entrances to the tunnels. The brave volunteered to enter the tunnel and close the leaf-disguised lid which covered them in darkness. Five minutes later we were standing above one of the cut out trenches and inspecting an air vent for the tunnels which was disguised as an entrance to a termite's nest. Heavy army tanks were explored along with the concealed kitchens and meeting points. Our guide discussed the many tactics the Viet Cong used during battle such as painful booby traps and simply wearing shoes back to front to trick the attackers. After exiting the kitchens, we were given the experience to try the food the Vietnamese ate during the war. Our last activity was the opportunity to explore one of the tunnels. The tunnels were extremely small and dimly lit and some participants even had to crawl. We managed to slowly travel one hundred meters of the tunnels and emerged covered in dirt and sweat. Visiting the Cu Chi tunnels gave us a greater insight to the struggles and victories of the Vietnamese and presented us with memories we will never forget.





Hao Lo Prison (Hanoi Hilton) - By Kailini Picton

While in the former capital of Hanoi we visited the Hoa Lo prison, which was used by North Vietnam during the Vietnam War. It was sarcastically nicknamed the Hanoi Hilton by the American Prisoners of War due to the miserable conditions they had to endure while being held there. Most of the prison was demolished in the 1990s but part of it exists today as a museum mostly displaying how the prison was used during the French Colonial period. As you walk through each room they act as an exhibit of the horrible conditions both captured Americans and Vietnamese political prisoners were subjected to, and provide information about certain people who among the imprisoned during the Vietnam War. It was surprising to hear that 2008 Republican presidential nominee John McCain had spent parts of his five and a half years as a POW there. It also came as a shock to see several of the torture methods used at the prison, in particular the guillotine used for beheadings and the rooms used for prolonged solitary confinement. It is hard to not feel a sense of sorrow as you are guided through the prison, learning about the types of things that occurred there, and it makes you realise how appreciative we should be of everything we have now when compared to those affected by the Vietnam war.



Traffic - By Maddie Burgess

First day in Vietnam and the difference between Vietnam traffic and Australian traffic was highly noticeable. In Saigon the traffic was unbelievable, 10 million people travelling around on 4 million little motorbikes. The worst part of the traffic was the fact that none of the motorbikes or cars would stop so you could cross the road, so when you want to cross you had to wait for a gap and practically run across the road before you got hit, AND It is amazing how many people or how much could fit on one little scooter!



Middle School Visit – By Sarah Johnston

On day 7 while in the city of Hoian we had the opportunity to visit a middle school. The group all took gifts to give to the school ranging from books to sporting equipment. At the school we noticed a few differences including that the school didn't have airconditioning and all of the students had long pants. During the time we were in Vietnam it was very humid and the weather on most days was very hot. The class sizes were a lot bigger than we have. 
