PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Welcome to the last newsletter for Term 3.

Year 12 – farewell and good luck! Firstly, I would like to wish Year 12 well in their countdown to the HSC

examinations. A letter has been sent to all parents and carers of Year 12 students this week with important information about the end of year activities and the HSC examination period. I would like to encourage all Year 12 students to work as hard as possible with their final study regime to maximise their results.

Revised formal examination procedures

Also included in this edition is an outline of the revised formal examination procedures. All students should familiarise themselves with this important document. Formal examinations must be conducted under strict guidelines — the revised procedures we are implementing at Mount View HS will enable students to become familiar with the procedures expected for the HSC examinations.

Team Ivy Day, "400 for Ivy" and the Leo's Trivia Night Congratulations to our students, staff and school community on the success of Team Ivy Day, the Red

Cross Blood Drive and most recently, the Leo's Club Trivia Night. Over \$4000 was raised on Team Ivy Day and a further \$2129.00 at the Trivia Night. These funds will be forwarded to the John Hunter Children's Hospital for their Play Therapy and Beads for Bravery programs. The Red Cross Blood Drive called "400 for Ivy" has also been very successful. The "400 for Ivy" campaign helped to bolster the Hunter region's blood donations during a particularly difficult month for the Blood Service (with colds and flus) and contributed to the 1130 additional blood donations made in the region in August.

It is worthy of particular mention that so much of the impetus for these charitable initiatives, comes directly from our students. The time and energy that they put into the organisation of these events, has been outstanding.

DEPUTIES' REPORTS

Trees

I am very pleased to be able to report that the unsafe trees as identified by our arborists report have been removed. Our students are to be congratulated on their cooperation with the procedures, especially with their patience with the fencing which did impact upon playground space.

Pedestrian Gate

All pedestrian traffic should now be using the new pedestrian crossing and the pedestrian gate to access the school. Thank you to students who have been maintaining a safe entry to school. Parents are requested that they park in the 'Basin' car park and use the crossing to access the office. Our next project will be to install lighting at the site of the gate and along the pathway, to ensure safe night time use of this entrance.

Year 11

All students have an Assessment policy and Schedules Booklet. I would ask parents to read the policy and 'Frequently Asked Questions' and to look at the calendar and discuss the timing and planning which is needed with their child. The 'appeals' process is most important, especially as we apply it stringently in the senior school.

Year 11 are approaching the end of the Preliminary Year and are reminded that any outstanding 'N' warning letters need to be attended to. Students will only be able to progress into Year 12, at the start of term 4, if they have satisfactorily completed the requirements of the course. Students are asked to speak directly with their teachers to ascertain what needs to be completed to do so.

I would also like to wish Year 11 all the best in their final Preliminary HSC examinations and in their 'Crossroads' camp. Students who are not attending the camp in week 10, are reminded that they should be in attendance at school, where they will complete the work to satisfactorily satisfy this compulsory unit of work.

Mr Peter Conroy – Yrs 8/10/12

Year 8 and 10 Subject Selections:

Thank you to all students who have completed subject selection forms for 2015. Year 8 students have been placed in Year 9 electives and have been advised of their classes. Roll Call teachers have the lists and are advising me of any input errors. This should allow classes to be finalised by the end of this term. Year 10 students will be requested to consider a final line structure shortly for Year 11 subjects. Because of the spread of subjects over six lines some students may be asked to reconsider choices to avoid clashes. While this process can be frustrating it is the logical outcome of giving the students a free choice.

Year 12

All students will receive a letter shortly that outlines the events that will occur at the end of this term and throughout Term 4. In this issue of the VIEW I would like to concentrate on the importance of the time leading up to the exams. Every year some students gain a great advantage over others by using this time wisely. All students should have a clearly written study plan that runs from now until each specific exam. In

particular they should know what they are doing in the first week of next term, the week known as STUVAC. Students are not required for normal classes but a number of staff members have made special arrangements for the students. Unfortunately the school can't remove teachers from all their classes and so, Year 12 students will not have 24/7 access. However students are welcome to come into the school, access the library and also access the teachers during the traditional Year 12 periods. As previously stated, students may also access teachers in previously organised times. Whenever the students are on school grounds they are expected to follow the school rules.

M & T academic testing for Year 7, 2015

The school is currently completing some testing for entry into the enrichment classes for Year 7, 2015. This will be completed by the end of Term 3. If you have students in Year 6 who may be interested in sitting the tests, or you are aware of friends who may be interested, please contact the school so that a testing time can be arranged.

School Attendance and Appointments

The school operating hours of 8.30am to 3pm are important learning and development times for your child. Please take this into consideration when scheduling medical and dental appointments.

School holidays and after school are ideal times to schedule routine appointments and check-ups. Missing part days may involve missing complete lessons in some areas and impact on the continuity in your child's learning.

If an appointment cannot be made outside of school hours, please consider returning your child to school (provided they are healthy enough) so as to minimise the impact of being absent. Thursday sport afternoons appear to be a preferred time for families to make these type of appointments but please remember that all students must attend a minimum of 80 to 120 minutes per week of school sport as a Department of Education and Communities requirement. School sport is an important part of the Mount View High School routine and participation in it is considered crucial in the social and physical development of our students. It appears from our data that students have weekly or fortnightly appointments in this time and they are at risk of not gaining the required hours and benefits.

Leaving School without permission

It has come to our attention that students have left the school grounds with family members and friends without the school's knowledge or permission. Of particular concern is Thursday afternoon during sport time.

As you can imagine this is highly concerning as knowledge of a student's whereabouts between the hours of 8.30am and 3pm is a legal requirement of the school.

If you or your representative, need to collect your child without prior notice at any time during the school's operating hours, they must be signed out via the Sick Bay or Attendance Office. The school will then have an accurate record of the whereabouts of your child and can ensure their safety.

Students who leave the school premises without permission are considered Truant and are placed on Attendance monitoring provisions regardless of who they are with.

Year 9 - Ms Roughan

Earlier this term Year 9 students who have maintained positive behaviours for learning throughout Semester 1 received a certificate recognising their great achievement. It was fantastic to see that 88 students across Year 9 have maintained a commitment to their learning. It would be an amazing achievement to increase this number to at least 120 for Semester 2.

During Weeks 9 and 10 all of Year 9 students will be involved in the Pit Stop program. The program is run by Cessnock Youth Centre and Outreach Service Cessnock City Council and is aimed at addressing sexual health issues. All of Year 9 boys will participate in the program on Tuesday 9th September and all of the girls will participate on Tuesday 16th September.

Our current Year 9 students have the opportunity next year to take on a leadership role as a Peer Support leader to the new group of Year 7 students. It was fantastic to see over 120 students nominate for this important role. From the students who have volunteered there will be 60 students chosen. Volunteers will all undertake two days of training early next term.

FORMAL EXAMINATION PROCEDURES

Formal Examination Procedures for Students

You will not be able to go to the toilet during the first ONE hour and the final 15 minutes of the exam.

Year 11 and 12 students are required to <u>attend only</u> <u>your exams</u>.

Year 7, 8, 9 and 10 students are required in lessons as per the full timetable during exam periods.

All electronic devices/mobile phones are not permitted in the examination room. (In the event of a device in the examination room, your exam paper will be taken and you will be escorted from the examination room to the Deputy Principal and your parent/guardian/carer will be notified by phone call).

Before Exams

- Permitted equipment is limited to the following: black pens, pencils, erasers and a sharpener, a ruler marked in millimetres and centimetres and highlighter pens which can only be contained in a clear plastic bag/sleeve.
- Check with all your Teachers about calculators. If you are allowed a scientific calculator it is your responsibility to make sure it is <u>Board approved</u> and in good working order.
- Water You may bring a bottle of water in a clear bottle.
- Watch you may wear a watch in, however your watch must be removed once seated and placed on the desk in clear view of the supervisors.
- All equipment you bring may be subject to inspection on entry. You will be directed to place any unauthorised equipment or material in a designated area. Examination supervisors will not be responsible for these items.

 School Uniform is to be worn. Be advised that the hall is cold in Winter.

Conduct during the Examination

- On entry to the examination room all talking must cease (you are under Examination Conditions). You must move quickly and sit at the desk showing your name and student number.
- · Face the front of the exam room when seated.
- Listen for your final instructions from the examination supervisor.
- It is your responsibility to make sure that the correct examination paper has been provided for the course you have entered.
- If you do not make a serious attempt at an examination, you will receive an 'N' award warning notification for the subject.

During the Examination

You will not be able to go to the toilet during the first ONE hour and the final 15 minutes of the exam.

- It is your responsibility to ensure that you write your answers in the correct answer booklets.
 Ensure you label each booklet CLEARLY: student number, question number and order of booklets.
- Place your hand up if you experience a problem and wait for a Supervisor.
- · Do not distract or disturb others while waiting.
- · If you finish your paper early, go back and check your answers carefully.
- · Do not scribble on the Examination paper or table.

You will not be released before the finish time of your exam.

When the Examination is finished

- Listen to the instructions from the Supervisor regarding the collection of papers. Arrange completed booklets according to instructions.
- If your paper finishes before another paper you will be permitted to leave the hall, but do so quickly and quietly; so as not to disrupt those still working.

If you cause a distraction in the exams:

- A note will be written on the top of your exam paper, such as 'first warning distracting others'.
- · If a further problem occurs, you will be escorted to the Deputy Principal's Office with your paper.
- PARENTS WILL BE NOTIFIED. You will receive a mark of zero, as per the Assessment Policy.

Illness/Misadventure

- If illness or misadventure prevents you from attending an examination, or affected your performance in the examination, it is your right and responsibility to lodge an illness/misadventure form to your teacher on the day of the exam or the day of your return. Late application forms will be considered only in exceptional circumstances.
- It is important that you attend the examinations where possible, even in the case of illness/misadventure. The Panel will not uphold an illness/misadventure application if the reason for your absence is not considered to be satisfactory to BOS stipulations.

ENGLISH FACULTY



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


Alex Deck

Phoebe Metcalfe

-Judge Gently-Contrary to whether we like it or not every individual in society has the basic human instinct to be judgemental.



"You could almost say that everything in the universe is run on attraction whether it's two molecules in a vacuum or an episode of Home and Away." – Bill Henson (one of my prominent influences.) My artwork admits audiences to judge these 6 extraordinary subjects, chosen based on their uniqueness and interesting facial features, beyond any preconceptions they may have had. This is done through the extraction of these subjects from their environments and any other contextual information that may influence an audience's judgement, limiting their perceptions to that only of appearance. Through this, the focus shifts to the light, detail and imperfections portrayed in each image. My use of black depicts everything from the beautiful, cynical, wicked, elegant, grim, fatalistic existentialistic nature of the individual. The desaturation of the images separates the artwork from the audience but the warmth brought back in by the colour embodies a warmth between them, drawing interest and curiosity. The size of the photographs offers a more intense and intimate experience allowing the audience to be encompassed by the perpetual darkness reflecting the harsh society in which we live. The title 'Judge Gently', although allowing consequentless permission to judge, instructs audiences to be wary of their own opinions and circumstances.

"We can speak only of what we know. If I say: 'I have a headache,' you understand. Your headache is not exactly like mine but there's something in common. If I say: 'My pancreas is ill,' I hope you won't understand! We cannot convey something that the other doesn't already know. As artists what we can do is work in the common space that belongs to everyone, though with some differences, and generate a different reading for everyone. The important thing about art is that it speaks about us, as ourselves, but at the same time, whoever looks at it can say, 'It's me, this is my story!'" – Christian Boltanski




Claire Taylor

My aim for the audience's reaction is to allow them to reflect on emotions or memories that the bold colours and movement bring back to life.

-Family and Friends-








Maxine Chapman





















CAREERS

Cybersafety

Tinder - Parents Be Aware



As often occurs, websites appear and operate largely unnoticed until our attention is draw to them through a serious physical world incident or concern. This has now occurred with the online dating site Tinder.

There is much coverage in the media now about this site as a result of being linked to a homicide investigation on the Gold Coast, Queensland. This site appears to be the nexus between the suspect and the victim.

Tinder is one of many online dating sites and has been around for a couple of years. In its purity it is no different to most online dating sites but should be considered concerning, especially for parents, due to specific functionalities of the program.

- GPS location function Users know the location of other users.
- Facebook link An account is created in Tinder through a users facebook account.
- Required age 13 This company supports 13 year olds using online dating sites.

Of course there are further underlying issues that can be created for children being present in a site that's sole purpose is to connect users who previously didn't know each other.

Some of our children will try this, as it is there in their face, out of curiosity or fun, however, not all users will be there for that reason. Please be aware and make parents aware of this program.

PBL - Positive Behaviour for Learning

Positive Behaviours for Learning (PBL) is a universal school wide management strategy designed to meet the needs of all students and to develop a common language and focus for all staff, families and community members.

PBL is specifically about teaching specific behaviour and social skills that lead to success in school, providing frequent positive reinforcement for expected behaviour, consistently addressing social errors, and arranging teaching and learning environments to ensure success for all. In order to identify interventions we are constantly gathering data, revisiting systems and practices.

Our universal strategies are Respect, Responsibility and Excellence which have been implemented consistently across a range of school settings, classroom and non-classroom. A number of interventions that we have identified and been focusing on recently include:

- 1) Getting to class on time
- 2) Canteen lines
- 3) Corridor movement
- 4) Playground safety
- 5) Mobile Phones 'bag or box' (not visible and turned off)
- 6) Binning rubbish
- 7) Equipment out 'ready to engage in learning'

Students have been shown a number of videos during roll call which were created by students modelling the targeted interventions. These video presentations have been highly successful due to students being taught explicitly and modelling the expected behaviour.

Throughout Term 3 targeted interventions will be implemented across the school to support our whole school approach to positive learning outcomes for students.


