RELIEVING PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

What a privilege it is to write as relieving Principal of Mount View High School for Week 5 of Term 3. I thank Desley for the opportunity as she takes some very well deserved long service leave in Fiji with her family. Here's hoping that her desk is as clean when she gets back as when she left.

This term we have commenced subject selection for students going into Years 9, Year 10 and Year 11 for 2016. I would like to thank the students and their families for their attendance at the information

evening. The Year 8 into 9 and 9 into 10 session was extremely well attended with plenty of additional chairs needing to be put out. The Year 10 into 11 evaluated very positively on the new format that allowed for more personalised classroom based information sessions regarding specific subjects.

As a school we adopt a process that is student driven. Student preferences form the basis for all of our elective subjects line patterns in Years 9,10 and 11. Whilst every effort is made to ensure that we cater to the specific needs and aspirations of

your child, as a school we are governed by constraints such as the popularity of a course, the number of classes that we are able to offer, the facilities available and the number of qualified staff. As such it is inevitable that some students may miss subject preferences. Year 10 completed the interview and line selection component of their selection process for the 2016 Preliminary HSC last week. I would like to thank Angela Roughan and her team as they guided students into patterns that hopefully deliver excellent student outcomes. Information relating to elective lines is being communicated via the school website and the school facebook page. We will endeavour to have resolved all students elective patterns before the end of this term.

I had the pleasure of accompanying some of our student leaders to the annual School Leaders' Breakfast at Cessnock Performing Arts Centre on Tuesday 4 August 2015. Australian Adventurer John Cantor reminded more than 170 students from the Cessnock local government area that success can be born through failure and hardship. The 30-year-old spoke to students about his journey in becoming the first Australian to cross The Brooks Range in Alaska, setting a speed record by crossing the range in 31 and a half days. "Sometimes to be successful in your goals, you need to be happy with having failed first," he said. Hosted by Cessnock City Mayor Councillor Bob Pynsent, the breakfast aimed to further encourage school students from across the region to set goals and overcome obstacles. John was open about difficult issues like anxiety and failure. Students took away key messages about building resilience and persevering with a theme of it is important to experience failure.

Our Year 11 student leaders this week will be putting their claims forward in nominating for the election of Captain and Vice Captain for 2016. Speeches will be delivered to Year 10 and 11 students prior to voting by both staff and students. Mrs Karen Blandon has been instrumental in developing leadership opportunities for the students of Mount View High School. Good luck to all students involved. Induction ceremonies will be held later this term with the view to release our current Year 12 leaders enabling them to focus on study leading up to trial HSC examinations.

Pedestrian Safety

I would like to remind all students that pedestrians should use the pedestrian gate and marked pedestrian crossing to ensure a safe arrival and departure. The top gate is clearly marked as a vehicular entry and exit and student should not get in the way of cars using this gate.

Those students who drive are reminded that they should exit the 'basin' carpark and turn left, on Mount View Road. As well as being the safest exit, it will serve to reduce congestion as cars bank up to stop at the pedestrian crossing.

N Warning Letters

Students with outstanding N warning letters in Years 10, 11 and 12 need to make an effort to complete the work and have these warnings redeemed. Please ask your teachers, head teachers, year Advisor or Deputy Principal for assistance if you need tom organise tasks or look closely at priorities for the completion of work. Remember that the homework centre is available on Mondays and tutoring is also available on a Wednesday afternoon. Remember that the library is available for study in between your exams, and of course you have access to your teachers during this time. Good luck to those students who are finalising their major projects or preparing for practical HSC examinations which are occurring over the rest of Term 3. Who can apply for disability provisions?

Any HSC student with a disability recognised in the Commonwealth *Disability Standards for Education 2005*. The definition of 'disability' in the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* (Cth) includes:

- physical
- intellectual
- psychiatric
- sensory
- neurological, and
- learning disabilities, as well as
- physical disfigurement, and
- the presence in the body of disease-causing organisms.

(Australian Human Rights Commission).

Note that the disability provisions apply only where the disability is such that a practical arrangement is required to reduce disadvantage in an exam situation.

Disability provisions also apply to temporary and emergency-related disabilities. A typical example of an 'emergency' is where a student breaks their writing arm a week before an examination.

Students who become ill during an examination period may be eligible to make an illness/misadventure appeal rather than a disability provisions application.

Disability provisions for other year groups?

Disability provisions can also occur for students in other year groups that meet the same needs basis.

Year 8 Year Adviser Report - Ms Rebecca Conn

Hello to all parents, guardians and Year 8 students. We have had a really good start to the term with many people involved in programs in the school. Mount View High School is working in conjunction with the University of Newcastle to conduct research into the impact of the universities investment into **AIM HIGH** programs.

AIM HIGH provides significant funding, events and support programs to Mount View High School and this research will investigate the success of these programs. Students will be asked to complete two surveys taking about 10 minutes each which ask about their thoughts and aspirations for the future. Fifteen students will be asked to complete a five minute

interview with the researcher from Newcastle University and thirty students will have the opportunity to complete a four week mentoring program.

In order for the research to be a success we require students and parents to complete a simple consent form and return it to the school by Tuesday 18th of August. The school will be posting the forms out early next week and we ask that you return them as quickly as possible.

On a serious note I want to alert parents to the number of students who have been issued a Letter of Academic Concern. Over the next few weeks I will be contacting students who have these letters issued and discussing with them how to resolve the letter.

Completion of Stage 4 Outcomes is vital in enabling teachers to determine the ability of students to meet Stage 4 outcomes and subsequently report on each students achievement. Below is a copy of the tasks due Term 3 and Term 4.

Please Note: Geography allocates 30% of marks to bookwork (10%), mapping & skills work (10% and written tasks (10%). This is ongoing assessment throughout the semester.

History allocates 40% of marks to homework (10%), bookwork (10%) sources analysis (10% and research (10%). This is ongoing assessment throughout the semester.

Agriculture allocates 2.5% marks to a progressive portfolio assessment which is completed throughout the semester. These tasks are additional to those listed above.

Courses will require additional homework completion to successfully finish the course.



Year 11 Year Adviser Report - Ms Sharon Curran

Term 3 is a busy time for Year 11. It is the last term of the Preliminary Course and all subjects will be completing assessments this term with the HSC course starting in Term 4. Final exams will be held in week 9.

The Crossroads excursion which covers the compulsory PD/H/PE course for senior students will be in week 10 and students are expected to be at school if not on the excursion.

Year 11 students will be given the opportunity to attend a Road Safety Education course at TOCAL College on Friday 28th August. We would hope that the majority of students will attend as we all need to learn how to be safe on the road. More information of this can be found at www.rse.org.au/ryda



ROAD SAFETY

sessions

Students take part in six interactive sessions.

- SPEED & STOPPING Demonstrates the physics of stopping and crashing as well as discussion of car safety features. Students experience through practical observation the relationship between speed and stopping distance.
- HAZARDS & DISTRACTIONS
 An interactive session where students strategise about managing distractions and improving their hazard perception skills.
- THE PERSONALITY TEST A reflective session designed to show students how personality and mind-state are both important aspects of the total road safety equation. Students self-assess against five personality areas and use this tool to analyse risky situations in cars.
- RIGHTS & RESPONSIBILITIES A discussion, routinely led by a Police Officer on key risk areas for young drivers and passengers. Features hard-hitting videos on decisionmaking and choices.
- AFTER THE CRASH A powerful presentation by a speaker about the crash that changed their life. Features a personalisation exercise where students see how a similar crash would affect their life and plans.
- GENEVIEVE'S STORY A heart-wrenching story of two girls who made one bad decision, the ripple effect of that and an exploration of how students could plan ahead for high stakes decision-making.

Road Safety Education Limited is the pre-eminent provider of road safety education for youth in Australia and New Zealand. The flagship RYDA Program is delivered to over 50,000 17-18 year old high school

students, at 90 venues.

By participating in RYDA your school furthers their committment to educating the 'whole student', providing an opportunity to learn essential life skills. 
Mount View High School also has an Earn and Learn sticker collection box located at school outside of the Attendance Office. We welcome your sticker donations.

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The Tell Them From Me student feedback survey

I am delighted that this term, our school, like many other public schools in the state, will participate in a Department of Education initiative: the *Tell Them From Me* student feedback survey. The survey aims to help improve student learning outcomes and measures factors that are known to affect academic achievement and other student outcomes. The focus of the NSW-wide survey is on student wellbeing, engagement and effective teaching practices.

The survey is a great opportunity for our students to provide us with valuable and quick feedback on what they think about school life, how engaged they are with school and the different ways that teachers interact with them. Schools in Australia and around the world have used the *Tell Them From Me* survey to help improve how they do things at school.

I want to assure you that the survey is confidential. The survey is conducted online and will typically take less than 30 minutes to complete. It will be administered during school hours between 17 August and 16 October. Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary.

A consent form and FAQs for parents/carers about the survey is being sent home. If you <u>do not</u> want your child or children to participate, please return the form to school by **Friday 21**st **August 2015.** Copies of the form and FAQs are available from the website above.

The Partners in Learning parent feedback survey

Our school will also be participating in the *Partners in Learning* parent survey, another part of the *Tell Them From Me* suite of surveys (student, teacher and parent surveys) on student engagement. The survey asks parents and carers questions about different factors that are known to impact on student wellbeing and engagement.

Running this survey will help our school understand parents' and carers' perspectives on their child's experience at school. These include: communication between parents/carers and staff, activities and practices at home and parent/carer views on the school's support of learning and behaviour. This valuable feedback will help our school make practical improvements.

The survey is conducted entirely online at home or on public computers. The survey will typically takes 15 minutes or less to complete and is completely confidential. The parent survey will be conducted between 17 August and 16 October. Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary, however, your responses are very much appreciated.



Attendance Concerns

Mount View has suffered a decline in Attendance rates this year and it is now starting to show implications in terms of student outcomes and wellbeing. This chart demonstrates the raw data gathered by our new Attendance and Wellbeing monitoring program *Sentral*, and it illustrates a decline in attendance by over 10%. (Please note: prior year's data does not exist in this format)

As we move into the next Assessment and Reporting phase please consider the impact your child's absences might be having on their learning.

Staff are analysing the data and school practices to identify areas and strategies for improvement within the system.



Regular student attendance is the most important factor in building a child's sense of connectedness and therefore improved state of mind. It has additional benefits in terms of language and cognitive development and socialisation skills and it is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. When your child attends school all day, every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

Ag Adventures – By Sam Jarrett

This term like all of the others is jam packed with activity on the farm. Show Steer Team is in full swing with about 8 students regularly attending to learn to lead and judge cattle. Our first competition at TOCAL is fast approaching and the dedicated students from Year 9, 10 and 11 are doing an amazing job.

Year 12 and some Year 10 Ag students have just visited AgVision 2015 at Sydney Olympic Park and had a

day full of activities. There were 50 sessions to choose from and students attended everything from Drone used in Agriculture to wool classing. They even had lunch cooked by Fast Ed from Better Homes and Gardens. We met a lot of industry leaders on the day and the students came back with a broader idea of Agriculture jobs available. Thank you to our sister Lighthouse school, Junee High School for hosting the event, they really did do an amazing job.

Year 8- There has been a change over in the year 8 subject with students swapping to either Animal Production or Vegetable Production. Gardens are being prepared by four classes this week and the other four classes are being introduced to their new babies, 20 layer chicks.

Year 9- Poultry production has begun and they are now the proud new parents of 20 layer chicks. They will learn everything from breeds of poultry, to reproduction and digestion. They have been issued their assessment task for this topic, so parents should be encouraging their students to get it done, we would also appreciate if you had some time to help your child by reading through at the end, or helping with the maths section.

Year 10- Sheep production has begun. This is a big unit for year 10, their assessment task, which has been issued, is long and is to be used for their Project 10 sessions. I have given the students unlimited funds to buy and start up a sheep business from scratch. I am looking for students to really think about the nuts and bolts of starting up a business. They need to buy land that is suitable for their sheep breed, all the equipment necessary to run the farm and look at ongoing costs. Please encourage your student to work on their assessment over the next few weeks as it really is not something they can do well in if they try doing it the night before.

Primary Industries- Year 11 is currently out on work placement, hopefully learning a lot of new skills we do not have access to on the school farm. We can't wait for them to get back and share their experiences. Thank you to all of the local businesses that have given up some of their time to teach our students about the Agriculture world. We really appreciate your ongoing support.

Year 12 are on the count down to the HSC this term. They are finishing off some of the last topics before they get into some heavy study/revision sessions. We would just like to remind parents that the Primary Industries exam is optional for your student; they will still receive a VET Certificate II even if they do not do the exam. If they chose to sit the exam, it can be used for ATAR marks also.

We have made many changes to our curriculum next year with two different courses offered in Year 9 and 10 as well as Senior Agriculture being offered to Year 11 for the first time in a few years. We hope that students and parents have appreciated the opportunity to choose from a wider selection next year, a lot of thought and planning has gone into these new programs and we hope they are a success. In the pictures below, I have included a photo that shows our practice hydroponics system we have been working on, to perfect the topic and practical activities before we put the unit into year 10. Each unit was carefully selected based on what students have been asking for and what we could source locally for materials.

That wraps up news on the farm for the start of Term 3, any questions or queries, please do not hesitate to ring and chat to your students Agriculture teacher or pop in and have a look at our set up.

Year 9 Geography


Ms Hunt's Year 9 Geography have been exploring the origins of our continent from an Aboriginal perspective. They have been busy researching Australian landforms and the dreamtime stories that explain the landform. Some of the stories the students have researched included Lake Eyre, The Three Sister and Uluru. The students then had to provide a series of illustrations using traditional Indigenous colours to demonstrate their understanding of the dreamtime story. The results have been tremendous with some students including dot paints, creating small books, using watercolours and some traditional Indigenous language. Through completing this task students have been able to develop respect for the cultural knowledge of the Indigenous people, while teachers have been able to provide an inclusive environment for all students. 

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

Year 7 Visual Art students prepared works to demonstrate their understanding of the learning that has been occurring in their classrooms in a wide and varied range of media. Sculpture, Painting and Drawing were the primary methods that students chose to highlight the concepts of Colour, Texture, Shape, Tone and Line. All works were designed and executed independently and are a testament to the range of wonderful creative skills that Mount View students possess.

Year 7 also displayed their works in homage to the popular Post-Impressionist painter Claude Monet. Their water lilies swam across the surfaces dappled in light and painterly techniques.










Year 9 Visual Art students used the class activities of drawing and printmaking to highlight their skills and explorations into the Animal Genre. Expressive drawing media such as charcoal, pastel, and shellac and Arte Povera style surfaces combine to create emotive and powerful animal portraits. Whilst the controlled design approach to the theme through Lino printing offered an aesthetic calmness and again highlights the range of student ability in the creative arts.

Artworks with layers of meaning and powerful statements have been the focus of Year 10 Visual Arts this semester and the works prepared for Showcase did not disappoint. Using only "found" objects; students were challenged with the creation of a work that expressed concern over a political, environmental, historical or personal issue. An asylum seeker boat crudely assembled is never going to make the journey successfully and will ultimately sink to the traveller's peril. Our natural environment can remain pristine whilst we seal it off, but open the "jar" and destruction commences. In the Second World War, Nazi rule ordered the confiscation and sometimes destruction of art and literature with mass burnings of books and artworks. Year 10 artists challenged the Showcase audience to look into their work rather than just glance at it.

Powerful stage photographic portraits were chosen by Year 11 Photography students. The viewer is left wondering "what is the movie or stage production that these characters have come from?" Sensitive and considered lighting combined with effective makeup and strong modelling, have created engaging and thought provoking images. The students also demonstrate with these works the high level of skill in post-camera production that they have attained in a short time of studying Photography. Special thanks to the teachers Ms Schafer, Ms Fullick, Mr Janovsky, Ms Wiseman, Ms Willis and Ms Alder for all of their skill sharing that enables Mount View art students develop artworks with confidence and aesthetic understanding.



Advice To Year 12

If you are experiencing anxiety, you are normal. There is no one who doesn't feel anxious at some time. It is even more common to feel anxious during adolescence, because so many changes are taking place in your body, your mind, and your emotions.



The optimal performance model shows us that for optimal performance (completing the HSC) we need to have a medium level of arousal. When our arousal is low we may be disinterested, distracted, or too relaxed, while when our arousal level is too high we may be too tense and unable to concentrate.

There are a few things you can do to reduce your arousal level.

- 1. **Exercise** It can be a simple walk, punch a boxing bag, or a game of a team sport. Why this works? When we feel anxious, our glands send a hormone called adrenaline into our bodies. Adrenaline is what makes our muscles tense and our heart beat faster. When we exercise, the adrenaline is expelled, our muscles relax, and our heart rate slows down again.
- 2. Laugh Laughter is a powerful antidote to stress, pain, and conflict. Nothing works faster or more dependably to bring your mind and body back into balance than a good laugh. Why does it work? Laughter triggers the release of endorphins, the body's natural feel-good chemicals. Endorphins promote an overall sense of well-being and can even temporarily relieve pain.
- 3. **Breaking big projects into small tasks** Stop breathe think. Using problem-solving skills means that instead of becoming overwhelmed or anxious when you encounter a challenging situation, you use your body and mind to help you find a solution.
- **4. Relaxation techniques** Your body can respond to worrying situations and anxious thoughts with muscle tension. Relaxing your muscles can help manage anxiety and stress. <u>A great free app is 'smiling mind'</u> it runs through a 5 minute relaxation / breathing track for you.
- 5. **Keep your life in balance** When people keep their lives in balance, their anxiety level tends to be lower. Staying in balance means that the way you choose to spend your time and energy is a healthy mix of <u>leisure</u> and <u>responsibilities</u>.

Staff are here to help. We want to see you leave Mount View happy and knowing you have tried your best. Please talk to someone – a friend, year advisor, HT Wellbeing, school counsellor – if you want any more advice of coping through the HSC.

It is important to remember that managing anxiety and eliminating anxiety are two different things. Coping skills help you to take care of yourself and keep anxiety from getting too high. But using coping skills does not mean that you will never feel anxious again. There will always be new situations and new challenges in your life. There is always support and help out there too.

School Counsellors

School Counsellors are qualified teachers who have a degree in psychology and post graduate qualifications in school counselling. The aim of the Counsellor is to strengthen schools' student wellbeing provisions and provide counselling and psychological assessment of students with specific needs.

There are a number of services available to our students, including:

- Counselling
- Intelligence, behaviour, emotional, social and academic assessment
- The development of school based support for students
- To support caregivers in addressing the social, emotional and educational development of their child
- To refer students and families to appropriate supportive external agencies.



School Counsellors are there to support **ALL** students. Mental Health is about more than Mental Illness. Having a trained Counsellor to listen nonjudgmentally and help a teenager develop strategies, plans and skills to support them now and into the future. Who wouldn't benefit from having a person you can vent all your frustrations, worries and hopes to?

Compulsory School Attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age. The *Education Act 1990* requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the Board of Studies, Teaching and Educational Standards for homeschooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school

LEARNING & ENGAGEMENT

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My child won't go to school. What should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education and Communities may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school.

Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

 Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

Application to the Children's Court
 Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department

may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The Department of Education and Communities recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.

If a student misses as little as 8 days in a school term, by the end of primary school they'll have missed over a year of school.
