PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE



Ms Desley Pfeffer

Welcome to our last newsletter of the year. As always, the end of year presentation assemblies have given us an opportunity to celebrate student achievement, to reflect on the year that was and to finalise our plans for 2017.

We as a school have also celebrated many successes this year and I mentioned the following, just by way of example, at last night's Presentation Assembly:

- Changes have occurred in our school curriculum to allow a little more flexibility, especially for students entering Yr 10 to change electives and diversify their range of study
- We added new electives such as iSTEM to better equip our students for the world of work in science, technology, engineering and Maths; and Physical Activity and Sport Study, with a specialisation in football
- Our F1 in Schools senior team "Revolution Racing" are NSW state champions in what is a very tough and prestigious worldwide competition and will now contest the National Championships early next year
- A new house system has been implemented with 8 houses and a strong sense of house pride as students and staff compete for house points
- Our LEAP (Learning, Exhibition and Performance) Centre was officially opened and has been a great venue for a huge range of community and school events
- Our visual artist students have had their work exhibited in the new gallery space
- Our music students perform to acclaim at every special school assembly and are regularly sourced for community performances
- Our refurbished school library attracts record numbers of students daily (and not just because of the airconditioning) and gives our staff a space large enough to accommodate us for professional learning activities
- Our partnerships with the University of Newcastle and the Beacon Foundation have provided more opportunities than ever before for our students to experience the world of work and further education and training
- Our sportspersons have excelled in every endeavour; the number of school representative teams has increased; and lunchtime sporting activities have encouraged many students to get active
- Nearly 1700 people follow our school's FaceBook page and in the last week alone our posts have reached more than 8000 people
- Our school song, "Stand Up Step Forward" written by our students is becoming part of what we do at MVHS
- For students studying the HSC we subsidised opportunities for them to attend study sessions and workshops so as to improve their results even further
- We funded students to enter national academic competitions in Maths and to experience the wonder of the Bell Shakespeare Company
- Yr 12 student Chloe Brown has been selected to perform in "Reprise" a Hunter based showcase of HSC performing arts excellence and was nominated for "Encore" in Sydney the outcome of which we are eagerly awaiting

- We've begun introducing a wellbeing framework perhaps you've seen "connect" on the wall of the MPC but what else is to follow remains a mystery!
- Recognised as a lighthouse school for agriculture we've hosted teachers from across the state in a 2 day workshop and Mr & Mrs Jarrett have provided ongoing mentoring and support to newly appointed and inexperienced teachers of agriculture and primary industry
- Our school was highly complimented on its adherence to departmental policy & curriculum implementation during a School registration inspection by the Board of Studies, Teaching and Educational Standards
- Our HSC results last year showed further improvement in the top bands of achievement with a healthy camaraderie among students to encourage personal bests in the HSC
- Our NAPLAN results show that 40% of our Yr 9 students achieved better than expected growth in reading and that more than 50% of our Yr 9 students achieved greater than or equal to expected growth in numeracy
- Our Aboriginal students' NAPLAN data continue to demonstrate achievement above state average in most areas

• Canine staff members – Brando, Peta and Marble have supported students' wellbeing and learning, delighted us all with their presence, and attracted interest Australia-wide starring, along with students Elle and Kim at our "Pause for Paws" forum in Term 3 when 30 teachers and counsellors from as far afield as Qld came to MVHS to share and explore ideas about animal assisted interventions in schools.

As for 2017 the challenges ahead are significant. The face of public education is changing considerably and this will require our school to adopt new ways of working. Many of the successes and improvements shown above are as a result of the greater autonomy and funding that we are fortunate to now have available to us and of our strong community partnerships, supportive P&C and very dedicated staff. So ... what's ahead?

- After several delays we will be refurbishing our school gym and finally creating our Futures Centre
- An expansion of student leadership opportunities to give them a real voice in the operation of our school
- The mystery of our wellbeing framework will be fully revealed and embedded in our school (& we're excited by the prospect of taking this out across our local government area in conjunction with Cessnock City Council)
- The launch of BYOD at MVHS and the exploration of more new subjects such as 'coding'
- The expansion of our support faculty catering for students with special and additional learning needs
- And maintaining and strengthening our commitment to our 3 strategic directions these centre around themes of positive student wellbeing, student engagement, learning which is personalised and responsive to student needs and local contexts, and organisational effectiveness and professional practice

I wish you all a very Merry Christmas and a happy and safe holiday period.




DEPUTY'S REPORT

A new policy relating to both Junior (Year 7, 8 and 9) and Senior (Year 10, 11 and 12) has been developed. This year we have also spent considerable time in improving the ease of use of this electronic document. **Every page is now interactive and is linked via clickable menus to make navigation a breeze.**

I highly recommend that students and parents are familiar with this document and the policy requirements therein. Individual subject schedules are also published detailing the date of assessment, the type of assessment, the weight of each assessment task and the topic students are to be assessed on. I would like to encourage parents to help their children keep organised with meeting assessment tasks deadlines by accessing the relevant booklets via the http://www.mountview-h.schools.nsw.edu.au/ school <u>curriculum-activities/assessment-reporting</u>. All students will have the electronic version of the assessment booklet delivered to them via their @education e-mail accounts. There will be hard copies available upon request from the school front office. Assessment reminders will continue to be promoted on the schools Facebook page on a week to week basis reminding both students and parents about what is coming up.



Term Four Attendance

Please note that the Attendance rules do not change during term four.

Mount View High will be providing meaningful curriculum based work up to the 16th December, as directed.

Families that have special events and holidays planned outside of the normal school holiday may collect 'Application for Extended Leave- Travel' forms at the Attendance Office.

May we also remind families that all 'Late Arrivals', 'Early Leaves' and Absences need to be explained. This can be done via letter, phone or reply SMS.

Students who require an early leave need to present a note from a parent/caregiver to the Attendance Office before roll call and then return here to pick up the slip at recess in order to then be permitted to leave class and the school grounds.

Following on with this, we ask that all students continue to carry their swipe card for late arrival and early leave.

Unjustified Absences

Unjustified absences will be shown on a student's attendance record where the explanation for an absence or partial absence does not meet with the Department of Education policy.

Valid explanations for absence include:

- substantiated illness
- substantiated medical appointments
- funeral
- moving residence
- unavoidable involvement in a serious family situation
- religious celebration
- misadventure due to emergency events eg: fire, flood
- family holidays (Leave application required)

All explanations for absence are required within seven days of the absence date(s). This should be prior to the absence in the instance of appointments and holidays.

In the case of extended periods of absence due to illness and contagion, by providing a Dr's Certificate, you may be eligible to apply for an 'Exemption from School'. Please contact the Attendance Office for further information.

iSTEM - by Mark Bassett, iSTEM Coordinator

Year 10 iSTEM students have been challenged with a range of practical projects this year to increase their problem solving skills as well as look at the advantages of authentic learning using FAIL method (First Attempt In Learning) involved with Project-based Learning (PBL). The class has just finished a spaghetti bridge challenge where students started with a basic beam bridge design using the least amount of material to make the bridge. A number of students were able to make a bridge using only 3 pieces of spaghetti that could hold the weight of a digital camera (124g). Next students had to add another bridge design (e.g. truss, arch, cable, etc) to the beam and hold as much weight as possible to try and achieve the greatest weight to bridge mass ratio. Congratulations to Naomi Martin, Daniel Lambkin and Ty Jackson who made impressive bridges.





Year 10 excelled with another project called "Rescue Me" where they had to design a vehicle to travel 10m using an electric toothbrush, plastic bottle caps, straws, skewers, cardboard and a hot glue gun. PDHPE offers students a break away from the academic pressures of the classroom and a choice to develop lifelong recreational skills, health related information to develop informed decision making as well as attitudes and habits which may lead to a happy, healthy lifestyle. To achieve this, the curriculum encompasses practical experiences in the areas of games, dance, athletics, fitness, gymnastics and recreational activities. PDHPE is concerned with the development of the whole individual – physical, social, emotional, cultural and spiritual. Therefore the theoretical components focus on the development of self-esteem, communication skills and healthy decision making especially concerning nutrition, drug use, sexual health and safe living.

Fitness and a general level of good health of the students remains an important long term goal of the PDHPE faculty. In 2016 the PDHPE faculty have had a major focus on fitness related activities where students were involved in a fitness program during terms 2 and 4. Students were pre tested on a battery of fitness tests, participated in the fitness activities and then post tested. Many students made very good improvements to their fitness levels.

The electives offered by the faculty during 2016 increased with the development of the PASS Football course. This has been an outstanding success evidenced through the active participation of both the year 9 and year 10 classes and the obvious enjoyment of the students. The PASS elective has shifted its focus a little in 2016 to not only provide enjoyable sport and recreation activities but to develop student capacity toward the Stage 6 PDHPE course. The Dance elective continues to be popular and caters for particular student interest. This course is designed to enhance students' dancing ability and group work through performance and choreography. The course provides learning opportunities for both the talented dancer and the student who wants to learn about dance. In 2016 the classes were involved with Starstruck and The Hunter Dance Festival and this will continue in 2017.

In 2017 it is anticipated that a new gym will be constructed at the school and this will play an integral role in PDHPE fitness lessons, Stage 5 elective courses, Stage 6 SLR and the lunch time gym club.

The PDHPE faculty is very thankful to the year 9 Boys Maintenance Group and the MC students who have worked to improve the school's facilities. They have constructed new and improved moveable goal post for use in PDHPE lessons and break time activities as well as the extension of the cricket practice pitch.

2016 has been a busy year for the PDHPE faculty as the staff have been involved with many KO sporting teams, sport and carnival organisation, Stage 6 mandatory Crossroads program, Stage 4 lifesaving program and a range of extra curricula activities. The energetic and talented PDHPE team look forward to an exciting 2017.

PROJECTS 7 and 8

7 Fearnley and 8 Dinnigan have now completed their final interviews for the year. Students in these classes have undertaken sessions regarding study skills, goal setting and futures planning culminating in the week 6 interviews of portfolio presentations.

All students are to be congratulated on the way in which they conducted themselves during the interviews. 85% of year 7 students and 80% of year 8 students gained a distinction or high distinction as a grade for their interview.

PROJECT 10

All Year 10 students were to be involved in this authentic assessment and interview program during week 7 of this term. Through the Project 10 program students were encouraged to develop better quality assessment tasks, improve their time management and study skills and to develop appropriate interview techniques.



Students worked through a program of 8 sessions throughout the year with a mentor preparing them for the interviews. All students are to be congratulated on the way they presented themselves for their interview as well as the obvious preparation that was evident. The panel members comprising a community member, a staff member and a year 9 student, were very impressed with the confident manner in which the students responded to each question.

Many thanks to the community members involved this year for willingly giving their time to be involved in this worthwhile program. Thanks also to the Mount View High School staff who were mentors and/or panel members for supporting the program. Each year 9 student involved as a panel member gained invaluable experience for their own Project 10 experience in 2017. A huge thank you to the TAS faculty and the VET students for providing lunches each day. It was very much appreciated.

In 2016 55% of year 10 students gained a high distinction or distinction and 73% of students received a credit or above. This is an outstanding effort and students should be proud of their achievements.

A friendly reminder regarding Health Care Plans in schools.

The Department of Education policy and procedures for students who require Health Care plans in schools must be followed. Parents/Carers who do not comply with the DoE policy are in breach of the 16A Child Protection Act.

Anaphylaxis

Parents/Carers of students who have this condition are required to:

- 1. ASCIA plan is updated every year by a GP and includes a review date.
- 2. Provide a copy of the plan to the school
- 3. Provide a epipen to be kept in the school clinic
- 4. Student to carry epipen at all times, clearly labelled and in a section of their school bag that is easily accessible.
- 5. Parent/student meeting to be held at the school with HT Wellbeing to discuss process and ensure paperwork is accurate.
- 6. Student information is disseminated to all staff and uploaded on school's electronic record keeping program Sentral.

Other health conditions

- 1. Parent/student meeting to be held at the school with HT Wellbeing to discuss process and ensure paperwork including emergency care is accurate.
- 2. Student information is disseminated to all staff and uploaded on school's electronic record keeping program –Sentral

Communication with parents

- 1. A review of each health care plan will be conducted twice in 2017 June and November /December.
- 2. A copy of the current Health Care Plan will be sent home for parents/carers to check and ensure information is accurate.
- 3. If changes have been made, key personnel within the school will make changes and disseminate updated information to staff.






