On Friday this week Mrs Pat White will also retire from our School Administrative & Support staff. Mrs White's association with MVHS extends back to the planning stages of the school, even before the school began in demountable buildings on the 'old school' site. Similarly, we will miss Mrs White's expertise in our office area but wish her well as she too heads into retirement.

Mrs Melissa Wyper, Head Teacher English, headed off for maternity leave as she and her husband eagerly await the birth of their first child in a few weeks. It is expected that Mrs Wyper will return in Term 2 next year and during the interim, Ms Rebecca Bartlett will relieve as HT English. As Ms Bartlett steps up she has passed her position as Yr 10 Year Adviser to Mr Nathan Russell who is an experienced and very supportive Year Adviser.

Mobile Phones and Social Media

At the end of last term I mailed, to each MVHS family, a letter and information about our school's mobile phone policy and social media. I hope that parents found the fact sheets to be useful in understanding just a few of the social media applications that young people are using.

The use of mobile phones in the school is problematic at times. Students and staff have been reminded of our policy – no student should be using a mobile phone in class unless directed to do so, for a specific purpose, by the teacher. Mobile phones should either be in a student's bag or in a box at the front of the classroom designated for this purpose – 'bag or box'. Similarly, we ask for parents' cooperation by not contacting their child at school during school hours unless it is absolutely necessary. It is preferable for any family emergency situation to be communicated via the front office so that appropriate staff can support the student to cope with any distress that this may cause.

Enrolments

Over the last few weeks we have welcomed a number of new (& some returning) students to Mount View HS. There have been many enrolments in all year groups except, understandably, in Year 12. We are most appreciative of the very encouraging and supportive comments made by parents as they have made the choice to enrol their child at our school.

Enrolments for Year 7 (2017) are very strong. There have been a large number of families who have requested out of zone enrolments and unfortunately, many have had to be declined. We can usually accept out of zone enrolments on compassionate grounds and on sibling rights. Beyond that we encourage families to approach their locally-designated high school in the first instance. If the principal of that school feels that enrolment at MVHS as an out of zone enrolment is warranted then a further request will be made to me.

Similarly, I do appreciate the strong advocacy that many of our parents provide in our local community – your support of the school is greatly appreciated. We do acknowledge that we may not always get things right and encourage you to bring this to our attention so that we can work together to resolve any queries or concerns that you may have. DEPUTY'S REPORT



Mr Shane Hookway—Deputy Yrs 8/10/12 Semester 1 Reports

Semester 1 reports were issued to students in Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 during the last week of Term 2. For most parents this will be the first time that you will have received the newly formatted report that Mount View High School has commenced using. In addition to providing enhanced information regarding your child's progress (now includes information on specific assessment task completion) every student's report is made available online via the Sentral Parent Portal. Access

to student reports will always be made available online prior to paper copies being sent home with your child. To support families in accessing their portal, parent portal access instructions and family access keys have been included with every student report.

In line with reports Mount View High School will be holding parent teacher interviews. Parents of Year 7, 8, 9 and 10 students have the ability to book interviews via their Sentral Parent Portal for Tuesday the 26th of July from 3pm through till 7pm in the school's multi-purpose centre. Parents who cannot access online services are invited to call the office on 49902566 for assistance.

Subject Selection

Subject selection has commenced for students in Year 8, 9 and 10 for elective subjects that they will study in 2017. **Year 10 students** have two rounds of subject selection. The first round determines the subjects line pattern. This essentially is what subject runs at the same time as another. A student cannot study two subjects that are being taught at the same time. By having students indicate their preference we aim to structure the subject lines in such a way that the majority of students are able to select the majority of the subjects that they would like to study for their HSC. The due date for indication of subject preference for Year 10 students selecting for Year 11 2017 was Week 1 of Term 3. Subject lines were released this week (Term 3, week 2) informing students for their interviews and actual (or second round) subject selection during Week 3.


Year 9 students subject selection opened on Monday the 18th of July and closes approximately one week later. **Students in Year 8** can make their subject selections from Week 3, Monday the 1st of August. Students in Year 8 and 9 will only make one round of choices. They will be required to choose reserve subjects that will allow timetabling to determine the most effective elective class structure to suit the needs of our students.

Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) implementation.

Mount View High School executive have commenced discussion around the implementation of BYOD. Planning will be the major focus for the remainder of 2016 with the initial goal to have BYOD in place at MVHS for the commencement of 2017. I will be using Newsletters and Facebook to communicate progress in relation to this. My advice would be to wait for MVHS's recommendations for device purchase released hopefully early Term 4. This should give parents and caregivers more than enough time to look at and purchase devices ready for the new school year.

Welcome to Term 3! I would like to first congratulate all students who were acknowledged at the Principal's Assembly late last term. The awards represent a culmination of many hours of effort and I was extremely happy to see so many wonderful Year 9 students receiving awards.

Subject Selection

Students will be receiving an email containing their webchoice password and login for subject selection 2017. Under the new elective structure students are required to re-pick their electives for Year 10.

Students are able to choose two **new** electives (which will be shown as "100 hour" electives on the ROSA) or they can continue with **one or both electives**. Students who achieve the learning outcomes of an elective in both Year 9 and 10 will have a "200 hour" elective on their ROSA.

There is no difference in the eligibility of students with 100 or 200 hour electives for any subjects in Year 11.

Webchoice for Year 9 opens on **Monday 18th July** and will close on **Monday 25th July**. If choices are not made during this time I will be interviewing students during weeks 5 and 6 and asking them to make that decision.

School Attendance and Appointments

The school operating hours of 8.30am to 3pm are important learning and development times for your child. Please take this into consideration when scheduling medical and dental appointments.

School holidays and after school are ideal times to schedule routine appointments and check-ups. Missing part days may involve missing complete lessons in some areas and impact on the continuity in your child's learning.

If an appointment cannot be made outside of school hours, please consider returning your child to school (provided they are healthy enough) so as to minimise the impact of being absent.

Thursday sport afternoons appear to be a preferred time for families to make these type of appointments but please remember that all students must attend a minimum of 80 to 120 hours per week of School sport as a Department of Education requirement. School sport is an important part of the Mount View High School routine and participation in it is considered crucial in the social and physical development of our students. It appears from our data that students have weekly or fortnightly appointments in this time and they are at risk of not gaining the required hours and benefits.

Phone Calls Home from Students

Mount View High has a fully functioning Clinic with qualified staff members who are the first point of call for all sick students.

Students are not permitted to phone parents directly to come to school and collect them.

Students will be taken to Clinic with authority from their classroom teacher as the need arises. The Clinic staff will administer aid as required and if the child is too unwell for school they will make contact with the parent.

Knowledge of the student's whereabouts between the hours of 8.30am and 3pm is a legal requirement of the school. Students must sign out of school using the official mechanisms. If they are sick and granted leave during the school day, this must be done through the Clinic.

Students making contact with people during class by mobile phone are in breach of the School's and Department rules and Code of Conduct.




MATHS FACULTY


PROJECT 10


the development of a charter for human rights after the atrocities that were committed during World War II. Students chose an area of interest ranging from Child Marriage to Capital Punishment.

This term Year 8 have been studying Rock Music .Our listening focus has been mostly on Australian rock while we have been performing classic rock guitar riffs.



Milne McLaughlin on the electric drums



These students were fortunate to have access to one of three of Mount View High School's baby simulators. These babies are programmed to display behaviours characteristic of a new born, including nappy changes, feeding, burping, rocking and quiet sleep times. The babies utilise sophisticated technology and are by no means dolls. They are complete with actual sounds recorded from real babies, are sensitive to motion as well as temperature. The inbuilt software is capable of recording detailed data, even providing feedback on such things as how long baby was in the same outfit, how long baby was allowed to cry for and if any care requirements were missed and any rough handling took place to name just a few. All of this data gives the students constructive feedback on their time spent with their baby. Students learn all about the operation and special functions of the babies. They watch a demonstration video which details all of the scenarios that they may encounter. They also have supervised, hands on experience in class with the babies on demonstration mode. On day one, the students collect their individually programmed baby, complete with a birth certificate showing the students' choice of name, gender and weight. The student receives a sensor bracelet which is recognised by the baby as the carer, each baby goes home with a bottle, spare nappy, a variety of outfits and portable carry cot. From this point on the baby becomes the responsibility of the student. The following quotes are from students reflecting upon their experience.

"Taking the baby in Exploring Early Childhood was an eye opening experience which gave me a whole new perspective on parenting. I was given information about the baby and how it worked as well as a demonstration so when it came time to being alone with no help from my teacher I felt well equipped with the necessary information. I felt calm and more at ease while caring for my baby having been prepared for my experience." – Jade Hawthorne

"I wanted to cry at like 2am in the morning!" – No Name

"Just like in real life my mother had to babysit for me while I went to work. The experience wasn't what I expected, I thought it would be more difficult but it was pretty easy." -Taylah Mills

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR YEAR 12 STUDENTS APPLYING FOR UNIVERSITY:

Each year the Universities Admissions Centre – UAC releases a guide for undergraduate admissions, free to all year 12 students. The UAC Guide 2016 – 17 has arrived at school and was distributed to all year 12 students who meet the ATAR eligibility requires and who wish to apply for tertiary study within NSW or ACT.

Important dates for UAC applications:

Applications open:	WEDNESDAY 3 RD AUGUST
On time applications close:	FRIDAY 30 TH SEPTEMBER
Late applications accepted up until:	SUNDAY 4 TH DECEMBER
UAC Application fees:	
On time applications:	\$32 3 rd August – 30 th September)
Late applications:	\$166 (1 st October – 4 th December

PLEASE NOTE: Once your application is completed you can login at any time and make changes to your preferences and contact details at no additional cost using the "check and change" options highlighted on the web page. Students will also use this option on the UAC website to check their ATAR and University offers.

Preparing to apply to UAC:

Students applying online to UAC MUST have the following:

UAC PIN—This pin number will be sent directly to the student's address registered with BOSTES. The school will confirm all students address details in week 1 to ensure all details are up to date.

HSC STUDENT NUMBER—All students should know their BOSTES number, if any student is unsure of their BOSTES number they should see Ms Schafer or Ms Rounsley (Relieving Careers Advisor) to obtain this number.

Access to a desktop or laptop computer – applications cannot be made from a tablet or mobile phone.

A printer – students will need a printed copy of the confirmation of application and the payment receipt / invoice.

A private email address - Shared email addresses are not acceptable

A method for paying- Application fees can be paid using a credit card or PayPal account if paying online, alternatively payment can be made by BPAY or Australia Post Billpay with a printed invoice.

PLEASE NOTE: Due to privacy legislation UAC will only provide information about an application to the student. UAC will not provide any details to the school nor can the school request information on behalf of the student.

For more detailed information on the UAC application process can be found at www.uac.edu.au

<u>My UAC – Mobile app.</u>

Once an application has been completed using a computer, students can then download and login to the My UAC mobile app to complete the following tasks:

- * Add and change course preferences
- * Check any documents requirements
- * View eligibility status
- * Check offers

Advice on listing preferences:

Course preferences are considered one at a time in the order in which they are listed on the application. To maximise the chance of receiving an offer, students should include courses with a range of cut-offs. UAC recommends students list their "dream preference" at number one (unless they are applying for early entry) and include one or two "safe" options to ensure that they get an offer. If a student is applying for early entry then this course MUST be listed as their first preference. Students can list up to nine different courses at nine different institutions.

Bonus points:

Bonus points **DO NOT** change a students ATAR. Bonus points change selection rank for a particular institution or course.

Some tertiary institutions automatically apply bonus points if a student does well in a subject related to the course they have chosen, or if a student lives or attends a school in a designated region. Students do not receive official notification of bonus points allocated to them. UAC encourages all students to check the institution's website for details on their specific bonus points.

If a student has experienced long – term educational disadvantage beyond their control, then the student can apply for the **EDUCATIONAL ACCESS SCHEME (EAS)**

Applying for the Educational Access Scheme (EAS)

To be eligible to apply for EAS, students must have experienced long – term educational disadvantage that has seriously affected their educational performance during years 11 and 12.

From August 3rd application forms are downloadable at <u>www.uac.edu.au/eas</u>. The school will also receive copies of the forms in early August. Completed forms must be submitted to UAC with necessary supporting documents and statements by September 30th.

Schools Recommendation Scheme (SRS)

Some universities make <u>early entry offers</u> through the Schools Recommendations Scheme. SRS applications are also used by some universities to make offers of undergraduate admissions using criteria other than or in addition to ATARs.

It is important to note that not all universities offer SRS and not all courses are available under the SRS. To find a list of universities and courses available under the SRS download the Schools Recommendation Scheme 2016 handbook for Year 12 student 2016 from the UAC website.

Applications are made online at <u>www.uac.edu.au/srs</u>. Any student is eligible to apply with no additional application fee. The school will also be required to provide information on the student's application and academic abilities via a separate online rating process.

Applications open Wednesday 3rd August and Close Friday 30th September.

FINAL HOUSE LOGOS



Our new House logos are now finalised and being displayed around the school. Each House now has a logo and mascot, voted on and designed by the students and staff patrons. Students and staff collaborated with a graphic designer to create the logos from start to finish. See the images following on the progression of how each logo evolved over Semester 1. Gather and Assemble even held a ballot to decide on their final logo !

All students are highly encouraged to be involved in their house activities and strive towards gaining points for their house as valued members of their house teams. House points can be rewarded in a number of ways including merit awards, attendance, principal's awards, carnivals, roll call challenges, school representation and extra curricular activities. Roll call groups are also house groups.

In each edition of the View we list the House Points Ladder and the top 5 students in each house for the month which is also displayed weekly on the LED screens in the playground.

The winning house at the end of each Semester is rewarded with an all expenses paid excursion. Gather and Assemble were the leaders for Semester 1 and students and roll call teachers in this house enjoyed a free excursion to Ten Pin Bowling and Gravity X indoor trampoline park.

Many staff and students have worked extremely hard to launch the new House System and should be congratulated on their efforts. 50 Staff and 340 students were surveyed on several aspects of the new House System and results were overwhelmingly positive. 83% of students felt that the staff in their house support their house team and 88% of staff agreed or strongly agreed that the introduction of 8 new houses has been successful.

75% of the 338 students surveyed feel a part of their house team as did 89% of staff. Roll calls are organised in to house teams with staff in the same house team as the students in their roll call. All roll call teachers surveyed felt that the purpose of roll call time was to develop relationships with students to enhance wellbeing and 96% of roll call teachers have deliberately spent their time in roll call this year developing their relationships with students in their noll call this year.

The new House system has encouraged participation in the sport and swimming carnival this year with 67% of students declaring that they enjoyed earning points for their house at these events in semester 1. Student attendance at the sports carnival has increased this year compared to 2015. 59% of students felt that the reward excursion motivated them to gain points for their house and 77% of students would like to attend the winning house excursion if their house wins.




