
ENGLISH FACULTY


James Ivan - Year 8 History

NEWCASTLE V8 SUPERCARS—Mr Graeme Lindsay





STUDENT WELLBEING



Steve Quigley - Head Teacher Wellbeing (Yrs 8/10/12)





Year 7 students who commenced the program this year at school and have completed consent cards will be seen in 2018 and can have the course completed then. If they did not return a consent form, they can receive their vaccines at their GP for free in 2017.

Year 11 and 12 students can also receive the Meningococcal (AWCY) in 2017 FREE at their GP.

DRUMBEAT

This term a small group of male students have been participating in the Holyoake DRUMBEAT program. DRUMBEAT stands for Discovering Relationships Using Music, Beliefs, Emotions, Attitudes and Thoughts. The program runs on a weekly basis over a ten-week period, co-facilitated by Mark Dewhurst from Samaritans and Mr Quigley. Participants explore several contributing factors to help promote positive relationships while increasing mental wellbeing, reducing psychological distress, increasing empathy and self-esteem while working in a team environment. At the end of this term, the students have chosen to complete a performance in front of trusted staff members.

A big thankyou to Mark for supporting our students and taking the time to deliver such an important program. We are currently investigating the possibly of running a girls' DRUMBEAT group in term one of next year.

SCHOOL LIAISON POLICE OFFICER (SLP)

This year, Mount View High School has continued our close partnership with NSW Police. The SLP role is to increase positive relationships and remove barriers between the school community and police. Senior Constable Collins is a dynamic presenter who has delivered numerous workshops to our students across all year groups in 2017. Snr Const. Collins delivers a diverse range of crime prevention workshops to raise awareness around challenges young people face in today's world.

In November, Snr Const. Collins delivered workshops to all Year 10 students. He addressed the importance of safe partying and being prepared prior to a party while also speaking about the dangers of the internet and Cyber Safety. Students left with an awareness of their responsibilities when partying and how the law may impact on them. As with most years groups this year, safe use of the internet and cyber safety drew a lot of interest as demonstrated by the many clarifying questions asked by students.



WHITE RIBBON

Mount View High School became part of the White Ribbon community in 2015 by undertaking training to participate in the 'Breaking the Silence' schools program. The program is based on primary prevention and supports schools to bring about a commitment to stop violence against women. It builds on existing initiatives to strengthen a culture of respect and equality at all levels of the school community – through curriculum, role modelling from staff, policies and procedures, domestic violence education programs and strengthened family and community partnerships.

Each year MVHS has increased our participation to stand up, speak out and prevent violence against women. This year our commitment to White Ribbon continued by actively promoting MVHS as a White Ribbon school. We redesigned our staff name badges to incorporate the White Ribbon School logo and gave staff the option of choosing between two designs. This resulted in a new staff name badge for all staff.

The Cessnock Chamber of Commerce White Ribbon Breakfast was held on November 14. Previously, only our

school captains and vice captains have attended with Mr Quigley and Ms Pfeffer. MVHS increased our participation in 2017 by providing an opportunity for additional members from our Junior Student Leadership team to attend and additional staff, demonstrating our commitment and ongoing support of the Chamber and White Ribbon. The breakfast is attended by Government representatives, Police, Corrective Services, local media, CWA representatives, community members local organisations supporting people experiencing domestic and/or family violence. During breakfast, students network organisation representatives and listen to the latest initiatives to help prevent violence against women. The breakfast is also supported by a guest speaker who is a survivor of domestic violence.

Our **Annual White Ribbon School Assembly** was held on November 21 which was again supported by our Mayor Mr Bob Pynsent. Mr Pynsent is one of two White Ribbon Ambassadors in the Cessnock


Community (our State Member Mr Clayton Barr MP is the other). As White Ribbon is the only global movement male led campaign, Mr Pynsent invited all male staff and students to take the oath. The response was unmistakable with all male members of our school community standing together, united to prevent violence against women. Mr Pynsent also invited our female students to show their support as feedback from previous years, they wanted to opportunity to take the oath as well. As a White Ribbon advocate, this was one spectacular sight and filled me with a sense of pride in our school.



To further enhance the White Ribbon message within our community, some of our Student Leaders were given the opportunity to develop their leadership skills by speaking with business owners in Vincent St businesses in the Coles and Woolworths complexes. This was a joint initiative between Mount View High School and the Cessnock Chamber of Commerce. Students' promoted White Ribbon by asking business owners to display A3 or A4 posters in a prominent position in their shop front window and sold white ribbons along the way. To prepare students for this endeavour, Geoff Walker, President of Cessnock Chamber of Commerce delivered a presentation to the leaders. Geoff addressed important points on making immediate connections with businesses and conveying information in a concise matter – especially when business are preparing for the Christmas trade period.

The support from the Cessnock business community was overwhelming as leaders ran out of A4 posters and raised \$197 with white ribbons and donations along the way. Businesses were also given an opportunity to provide feedback which was positive and fully supportive of the joint initiative between Mount View High School and Cessnock Chamber of Commerce.

Wellbeing initiative with Mr Quigley's Support Class

This term students in Mr Quigley Support Class have taken up an opportunity to expand on one of Mount View High School's internal wellbeing program – The Green Thumbs. The Green Thumb wellbeing program is designed to equip, support and empower young people to develop a positive image towards themselves, school and their community in a safe environment. It includes hands on tasks specifically working on gardening projects within the school setting. This is a chance for participants to develop a sense of teamwork, self-awareness and provides a supportive environment.

There are a number of additional benefits for students which have been supported by research. Benefits include but are not limited to:

- giving sense of responsibility
- allows nurturing
- keeping connected to other living things
- assists us with relaxation
- releases hormones making us happy
- assists with managing negative emotions and self-regulation
- allows us to feel in control
- reminding us of the cycle of life
- supports Mount View High School's 5 Ways to Positive Wellbeing

Students have established four garden beds, with the support of Phil our farm assistant. The gardens were prepared using fertilizers collected from Ag Farm animals and mulch. Students also collected seeds from produce at home and dried them out in anticipation for planting. The class planted and regularly watered a variety of pumpkin, rockmelon, watermelon and tomatoes for harvest in term 1 2018.

While participating in the initiative, students have developed a sense of belonging and purpose, pride and a visual sense of achievement. Discussions, while attending to the garden beds, have led to developing their knowledge around sustainability, environmental factors, team work and recently pollinating flowers without bees.

Students are enthusiastic to see the development and growth of their produce and are excited about the harvesting early next year. Mr Quigley's class would like to extend their appreciation to Phil, both Mr and Mrs Jarrett, Mrs Death and Mrs Myers for their support during this process.

- Andrew Scipione (Community service) Former NSW Police Commissioner




