Parent survey

Thank you to the many parents who, whilst attending the Parent Teacher Night on Tuesday 25 July, took up the opportunity to complete a survey that will help our school planning efforts for the next strategic plan for 2018 – 2020.

Fifty-one (51) surveys were returned. The full results have been shared with staff and will be analysed further to help us finalise our school vision and the three (3) strategic directions of the next three year period.

Of the surveys returned:

- 96% of parents indicated they were either very happy or happy with MVHS as a school for their child/ren.
- 92% of parents indicated that it was very likely or likely that they would recommend MVHS to a friend or colleague
- Parents indicated a range of reasons why they were happy or would recommend the school, with the main reasons being:
 - ◇ Dedicated, hardworking teachers
 - ◇ That their child is happy, settled and achieving at school
- When asked what they expect most from MVHS for their child/ren's education, again there was a range of responses, with the main comments being:
 - ◇ A safe, happy, nurturing and positive learning environment (17 responses)
 - ◇ Being kept informed, receiving feedback, communications and following up with parents (10 responses)
 - ◇ A wide and varied range of academic opportunities (10 responses)
 - ◇ Good marks / results / achieving their goals/ reaching their potential (9 responses)
- Those things mentioned as what parents most liked about MVHS, included:
 - ◇ Caring staff / good teachers (20 responses)
 - ◇ Good environment, resources and facilities (13 responses)
 - ◇ Approachability of staff (10 responses)
- When asked about the things that parents would most like to see improved, there was a huge range of answers – the only two that had some agreement were:
 - ◇ Communications about homework, assessment, events etc (8 responses)
 - ◇ Uniform (7 responses)
- 89% of parents felt that academic achievement and student wellbeing are equally important; the remaining 11% of parents indicated that student wellbeing was more important than academic achievement.

I would like to assure parents that the results of the survey will be taken into account when planning for the next 3 years and will be discussed, at length, with our executive staff to ensure that we are listening and taking action on those things that matter to you.

Year 12 preparations for the HSC

It has been very pleasing to see the number of Year 12 students who are making use of the many opportunities to improve their results in preparation for the HSC, including:

- School holiday and weekend workshops in some subjects (many will run in the next school holidays as well)
- The trial of HSC Hub – online resources and videos in many HSC subjects
- Senior study sessions on Tuesdays in the library from 12.30 – 2.30
- Before-school revision sessions for some HSIE subjects

I would also encourage Year 12 to avail themselves of the opportunity to learn some ways to manage stress by attending the sessions in the LEAP Centre on Tuesdays from 11.10 – 11.30, starting this week.

N determinations – unfortunately there are some Year 12 students who, at this stage, still have outstanding assessment tasks and who are now placing their HSC in jeopardy. Students who will be “N determined” (that is, deemed to not have successfully completed their HSC studies in one or more subjects) will be interviewed, with a parent or carer, in the week beginning 28 August. Any students who believe that they have outstanding work should speak with their teacher/s immediately.

LMBR – a new system of finance and student management

All Department of Education schools have been introducing the LMBR (Learning Management Business Reform) systems which has included a completely new finance and student management system. Our school ‘went live’ on Monday 24 July. This meant considerable interruption to payments, receipting and ordering for some time. I would like to thank our parents and students for their patience while the roll-over to the new system was completed and for their (continued) patience as we all learn the intricacies of the new system.

DEPUTY’S REPORT

Semester 1 reports were issued to students in Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 during the last week of Term 2. Semester reports are made available online via the Sentral Parent Portal. Access to student reports is generally made available online prior to paper copies being sent home with your child. Parents who cannot access online services are invited to call the office on 49902566 for assistance.

Subject Selection has commenced for students in Year 8, 9 and 10 for elective subjects that they will study in 2018.

Year 10 students have two rounds of subject selection in preparation for Year 11 (2018). The first round determines the subject line pattern. This essentially is what subject runs at the same time as another. A student cannot study two subjects that are being taught at the same time. By having students indicate their preference we aim to structure the subject lines in such a way that the majority of students are able to select the majority of the subjects that they would like to study for their HSC.

Year 8 and 9 students have one round of subject selections. Students in Years 8 and 9 who miss preferred subjects will be interviewed to determine appropriate replacements.

DEPUTY'S REPORT

Staff Development Day

On the first day of Term 3, staff met for a variety of professional learning activities in the library.

The first session focused on development of a new vision statement for our school as well as assessing and discussing the 'Learning Culture' domain from the School Excellence Framework in preparation for the 2018 - 2020 school plan.

The excellence statement for the 'Learning Culture' domain says that 'in schools that excel, school culture demonstrates the building of educational aspiration and ongoing performance improvement across its community. Students take responsibility for their ongoing learning.'

Our discussions focused on ways in which we could improve our current rating through consolidation and strengthening of our teaching and learning strategies.

The second session consisted of a refresher workshop on the use of 'Learning Intentions' and 'Success Criteria' in our lesson delivery and teaching literacy through the use of the 'Super 6' strategies of Questioning, Predicting, Monitoring, Summarising, Visualising and Making Connections.

Staff are revitalised and enthusiastic and ready to deliver exciting new units in Term 3!

Parent Teacher Interviews

Thank you to those parents who were able to attend progress interviews on Tuesday 25th July. This is a valuable exercise which allows parents to gauge a clearer picture of their students' progress during semester one and also allows time for planning of improvement strategies which may assist further development in the second semester. If you were unable to attend and would like to arrange either a personal or phone interview, please phone 4990 2566 to discuss a suitable arrangement. Our staff are always happy to speak with parents outside of their teaching time.

HSC Hub Trial

For the first five weeks of this term, Mount View High School is running a trial with Atomi across our senior cohort. The trial will provide unlimited access for all year 11 and 12 students and staff members to HSC hub which makes awesome online video courses for high school students, teachers and schools. Videos can be used in the classroom as a teaching support resource, whilst being issued outside of the classroom to increase support for students as study tool. This will allow Year 12 access to this resource right up until their HSC Trial examinations.

Year 12 Trial HSC

The Trial HSC runs from week 5 of this term starting on Monday August 14th. Students will be provided with a hard copy of both the examination timetable and the rules and regulations associated with examinations at Mount View High School. This information will be provided digitally to students via their @education e-mail accounts and posted onto the school Facebook page. Of particular note in the rules and regulations are that all students must wear full school uniform. Students are also advised to leave their mobile phones at home. Mobile phones are not permitted with the students in the examination hall or room. Students are advised to be present at least 15 minutes early to organise themselves and be seated. Whilst Year 12 students are only required to attend their examinations during the exam period all students are expected to return to normal lessons at the end of the examination period. It is important that students attend every day right up to the end of the term to maximise learning opportunities and to receive and implement examination feedback.

Subject Selections for 2018

Subject selection has commenced for students in Year 8, 9 and 10 for elective subjects that they will study in 2018. Year 10 students have two rounds of subject selection. The first round determines the subjects line pattern. This essentially is what subject runs at the same time as another. A student cannot study two subjects that are being taught at the same time. By having students indicate their preference we aim to structure the subject lines in such a way that the majority of students are able to select the majority of the subjects that they would like to study for their HSC. The due date for indication of subject preference for Years 8, 9 and 10 students through web choice was Wednesday 26th July.

Subject lines are then released, informing Year 10 students of final curriculum line patterns in preparation for their interviews and actual (or second round) subject selection from Wednesday 9th to Friday 11th August.

Students in Year 8 and 9 will only make one round of choices. They are required to choose reserve subjects that will allow timetabling to determine the most effective elective class structure to suit the needs of our students.

If any student missed the subject selection choice window, they can see their Year Adviser for advice and assistance.

Subject Selection for Senior School

This term Year 10 are becoming very future focused with students selecting their subjects for Year 11 & 12.

The dates and timeline for subject selection are summarised as follows:

- Step 1: Determine subject interest - Week 2 Term 3 deadline **2pm Wednesday 26th July**
- Step 2: Form Year 11 lines based on interest - Week 3 Term 3 released online **Tuesday 1st August**
- Step 3: Students interviewed by MVHS staff - Week 4 Term 3 **Wednesday 9th August**
- Step 4: Student subject selection from lines - Week 4 Term 3 **Wednesday 9th August**
- Step 5: Consolidate subjects at risk. Final lines published - Week 6 Term 3 **Tuesday 22nd August**

Students and parents should familiarize themselves with the rules for obtaining the HSC qualification. These are summarized below:

Both the Year 11 and Year 12 pattern of study must include:

- 2 units of **compulsory English**
- at least **6 units** of Board Developed Courses
- at least **3 courses** of **2 units** value or greater
- at least **4 subjects** (including English)
- a maximum of **6 units** of Science may be included in the Year 11 pattern of study.
- from 2019, a maximum of **7 units** of Science may be included in the Year 12 pattern of study.

Another thing to be aware of is the difference between Board Developed and Board Endorsed subjects. Board Endorsed subjects DO NOT count towards an ATAR and if more than one Board Developed course is studied a student will not be eligible for an ATAR but will still receive the HSC qualification.

If there are any questions surrounding subject selection please contact myself, a Deputy Principal, Rebecca Rounsley (Futures Adviser) or subject Head Teachers.

Assessments

As this term continues it is essential that students keep up with their assessment tasks. Assistance can be found at Monday afternoon Homework Club in the Library or from teachers.

Project 10

Project 10 session 5 will be held on the 31st of July. Students should ensure they are retaining appropriate assessment tasks which will be used in the Project 10 Interviews (20th of November to 22nd of November).

Project 10 is a mandatory part of Mount View High School's Year 10 curriculum and needs to be completed before students enter Year 11.

Interested students attended an "English in Industry" workshop at school on the 27th of July. They heard about how presenters use English in their jobs, the importance of English in many varied industries and how many different outcomes can occur based purely on our use of English.




English is used in so many roles in vastly different ways such as marketing, journalism, legal, medical industry, public relations, web development and so many more. The e-Beacon presenters were from different industries to give a diverse overview of how they use English.

At this stage, Year 10 students are making or have made their initial subject selections for Year 11. It is essential that students consider which subject is right for them and make an informed choice when it comes to English, which remains the only compulsory subject. For students planning on moving into a job or trade, English Studies is a fundamental course that supports students developing their general literacy skills. There is a change in 2018 where there will be an ATAR option for English Studies, but it is not generally recommended for students seriously considering University. English Standard and English Advanced are better preparatory subjects for students looking to move into Tertiary study. The additional course available for students who excel in English is Extension English and this runs as an off line subject focusing on more extensive writing and analytical skills. For further advice, students should have a discussion with their classroom teacher, the English Head Teacher and, potentially, Mrs Rounsley as the careers advisor.

Students must present a 1-2minute monologue. Lists available on Bell Shakespeare website, or choose your own.



- as part of their unit on Changing Places – it was great to see the effort and energy the class put in to proving their points!



"It was a really enjoyable day that helped provide me with a resource to further my abilities and greatly helped in my summarising."




Year 10 Geography students have recently completed their Project 10 Task, in which students selected an area of interest to explore challenges to global human rights. Using the HSIE faculty laptops students were able to start their research in class under the guidance of their Geography teacher. Students then took their findings away to create an original book to educate their peers about their human rights issue.

A deep level of knowledge was built as the result of this task with students acquiring skills in time management, research, technology and visual presentation.

The allocation of four class periods required students to use their time effectively to gather information and allocate time at home to complete the assessment. Students had to access a variety of sources to demonstrate their capabilities in undertaking research. In addition to researching their topic, a number of statistics, maps and pictures had to be selected and formatted in the presentation of their book, furthering their graphic design skills. Many students have submitted original and engaging tasks and should be commended on their success.

Change over of courses in Years 7, 8 and 9:

Students in these year groups have changed over courses in their mandatory study of History and Geography. As such, all students are undertaking a new course this semester. In order to ensure students are well-prepared for their new course, it is vital that they present to class with the correct equipment every lesson.

This includes:

- a new exercise book (A4, 128 pages is preferred),
- a pencil case with several working pens, coloured pencils, lead pencil and eraser and a clear plastic ruler.

Students will have received Assessment Overviews for their courses in Week 1, they are encouraged to mark these dates on the calendar at home to help in their organisation for assessment tasks.

Year 12 Study Sessions:

The light at the end of the tunnel is well and truly coming into focus for our Year 12 students and this term will see them complete their formal studies. As such, several HSIE subjects are continuing to offer additional lessons to help students further develop their content knowledge and skills in addressing examination questions.

The following schedule is in place for Term 3:

I would like to thank the parents who looked after the Tasmanian boys while they were in Cessnock, especially Mrs Lambkin who picked them up from Sydney airport, The Lambkin, Connor and Whiteley families who looked after the Tasmanian boys while they were in town and Ms Pfeffer for allowing the team to work at school during the holidays.



The team visited the University of Wollongong on Monday 11th July to discuss aerodynamics, team communication methods over a long distance, CFDs (Computational Fluid Dynamics) as well as using social media to make people aware of the team with world's number one Formula SAE team from Wollongong University. 

Improving our school uniform

Winter is always a difficult time to keep warm whilst at school. Our current uniform allows students to wear clothing that adheres to our policy and maintains our school colours. However, far too many students are presenting to school with multi coloured jumpers, advertising logos on jumpers and tracksuit pants, lycra tights, football jackets and jeans.

The Department of Education *School Uniform Policy* states that:

All students are expected to maintain a neat appearance, including adhering to the requirements of the school uniform policy

Our school policy has been developed in consultation with the Mount View High School Parents and Citizens (P & C) Association. The expectation from the school community is that the principal and staff will ensure that the requirements of the Uniform Policy are adhered to by all students.

Benefits of School Uniform

The wearing of school uniforms by students will assist the school in:

- defining an identity for the school within its community
- developing students' sense of belonging to the school community
- providing an opportunity to build school spirit
- enhancing the health and safety of students when involved in school activities
- promoting a sense of inclusiveness, non-discrimination and equal opportunity
- reinforcing the perception of the school as an ordered and safe environment
- increasing the personal safety of students and staff by allowing easier recognition of visitors and potential intruders in the school
- promoting positive community perceptions of public education
- making school clothing more affordable for families by eliminating the risk of peer pressure to wear transiently fashionable and expensive clothes.


SUPPORT FACILITY

Applications for tertiary study in 2018 Important dates.

Monday 31st July – Year 12 students eligible to apply for university in 2018 will receive their four – digit UAC pin via email. Please double check your email address with Ms Rounsley or Mrs Ambrum in the Futures Centre.

Wednesday 2nd August – Applications open.

You will need your UAC PIN and Year 12 student number to apply for tertiary study through UAC. Once you have entered your contact details into the online application, you will receive a UAC Application Number. They'll need this number and your UAC PIN to make changes to your application and access offers.

On-time applications are now referred to as 'early bird applications'. The processing charge for early bird applications is **\$58 for domestic Year 12 applicants** and \$68 for international Year 12 and all non-Year 12 applicants.

Friday 29th September – Applications Close

All applications received from 30 September 2017 will incur a **standard processing charge of \$183 for domestic Year 12 students** and \$193 for international Year 12 students

Changes for 2018 admissions

- The maximum number of preferences will now be five.
- There will be an offer round after ATAR release and before Christmas.
- There will be an offer round in mid-January but no 'Main Round'.
- SRS offers will be made in November.
- Cut-offs will be published for the pre-Christmas round and the mid-January round.

Schools Recommendation Schemes (SRS)

Schools Recommendation Schemes (SRS) are one way institutions make early offers of undergraduate admission to current Australian Year 12 students, using criteria other than (or in addition to) the ATAR.

SRS applications **open on Wednesday 2 August 2017** and **close at midnight on Friday 29 September 2017**. After this date, students cannot access or modify their SRS application.

There are two types of offers available under SRS. Successful applicants may receive:

1. a conditional offer (where there are additional criteria to meet, such as a minimum ATAR, portfolio or audition)
2. an unconditional offer (where there are no further requirements to meet).

SRS applicants must have any courses they would like to be considered for an SRS offer included in their list of preferences by midnight on Sunday 12 November 2017.

SRS unconditional and conditional offers will be released on Thursday 16 November 2017.

Full details of participating institutions, the application process, course available and eligibility criteria can be found on the UAC website from the end of July.

The Schools Recommendation Schemes (SRS) 2017 booklet will be delivered to schools at the end of July/early August and is available for download at uac.edu.au/srs.

Educational Access Schemes

Educational Access Schemes (EAS) aim to help students whose education has been negatively affected during Year 11 and/or Year 12 receive an offer to university. Institutions use EAS to help eligible applicants gain admission to university if their ATAR is below a course cut-off by allocating bonus points, or places, to eligible EAS applicants.

EAS applications open on Wednesday 2nd August 2017. If students apply by 30th November 2017, UAC will send them an eligibility letter on 12th December 2017. The letter will list EAS eligibility for all institutions.

For more information, read the EAS Eligibility Letter and Institution Policies fact sheet available on the UAC website from Wednesday 2nd August 2017.

The Educational Access Schemes (EAS) 2017–18 booklet, which includes an application form, will be delivered to schools at the end of July/early August. The booklet, application form and supplementary application form will be available to students from Wednesday 2nd August 2017.

Equity Scholarships

Equity Scholarships (ES) assist financially disadvantaged students with the costs associated with higher education. Students apply online for an Equity Scholarship through UAC.

ES applications open on Wednesday 2nd August 2017. A list of key dates will be available on UAC's website and on the inside cover of the Equity Scholarships 2017–18 booklet, which will be delivered to schools at the end of July/early August. It will also be available to students on UAC's website from Wednesday 2nd August 2017

The most important scholarship offer rounds for Year 12 students are on Friday 22nd December 2017 and Monday 15th January 2018. These rounds are when most Year 12 applicants receive their ES offers. Further ES offer rounds are available throughout 2018.


