PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

It seems that Term 3 has been one of my busiest terms ever at Mount View HS. I can't remember having had so many student and staff successes to celebrate, or so many projects and initiatives on the go at once!

Congratulations - So much to celebrate!

- MVHS's win at the Annual Mayoral Debate
- our Girl's OzTag team will represent the Hunter region at the State Championships on Wednesday 12 September
- F1inSchools results at the regional competition MVHS will have 4 teams (Pentessellate, Impro Racing, Flaming Speed and Bullet Fury) competing at the state finals for the F1 in Schools competition 5-7 November. Pentessellate were the overall winners at the Regional finals.
- Student, staff and program awards at the Cessnock Community of Great Public Schools' Education Week Reception
- Kullaburra Awards where many of our ATSI students' successes were recognised thank you
 Mrs Jeffery for deputising in my absence on this occasion

External Validation (EV)

Each year all Department of Education schools undertake a self-assessment against a School Excellence Framework. Once in every 5 years the school will be externally validated against the framework by a panel who are specifically trained for this purpose. MVHS has just recently undergone this process. After weeks of collating evidence against the 14 elements of the School Excellence Framework, annotating each piece of evidence, writing analysis statements and then an Executive Summary, we were extremely proud to present our school and its achievements to the panel.

The panel validated our self-assessment in all areas of the framework. Our achievements in the elements of wellbeing and school resources was deemed to be at the highest level — 'excelling'. Ten remaining elements were deemed to be 'sustaining and growing' (with much emphasis on the 'growing' part!) and two elements were self-assessed as 'delivering.' We will showcase our submission at the P&C meeting and explain this most important process further. Suffice to say,



the external validation process certainly affirmed that we are 'kicking goals' in many areas and something that we have much reason to celebrate. Thank you to the EV Team – Mrs Jeffery, Mr Hookway, Mrs Steiner, Mrs Bailey (Principal Support Officer) who assisted me greatly in this process!

Cooler Classrooms Program

MVHS will qualify for additional air conditioning to all learning spaces under the government's Cooler Classroom Program! Whilst we recently installed 15 units to various areas across the school, we will be inspected by the Department of Education in the forthcoming holidays to get ready for ALL learning spaces to have air conditioning installed. The exact date for installation is not known at this stage. We are, however, installing an extra-large ceiling fan in the MPC before the end of this term! The structural engineer's report is in, the approval has been given and the P&C have generously donated over \$8000 to split the cost of the fan with the school. It will certainly be welcome relief in the upcoming warmer months.

PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Road Safety Review - Staff car park

In response to a Departmental safety alert I recently undertook a safety review of our staff car park and bus bay area with the Department's Health and Safety Consultant and Warren Jeffery from Cessnock City Council.

The safety alert has been published in response to a tragic accident at a school in Western Sydney last year which caused death and serious injury to young students at the school. As a result, you will see a few changes to carparking in the school grounds and additional signage in the school vicinity. More information will be published as this work is undertaken. In the meantime, as always, we ask that parents do not enter the staff car park to drop off or pick up students (with, of course, the exception of disabled students who should park in the designated parking spots).

Transition Visits to Primary Schools

Transition visits to most of our local primary schools were undertaken recently. Accompanying me on the visits was Mr Hookway (Yr 7, 2019 Deputy Principal), Mrs Myers (Head Teacher Wellbeing), Mrs Bendall (Yr 7, 2019 Year Adviser), Mrs Parish (Learning and Support Teacher) and, for the first time, current MVHS students who had previously attended those schools visited. This was a welcome addition to our transition team and it was wonderful to see such strong ambassadors for our school speaking with assurance and pride in our school as they spoke to Year 6 students about high school.

Enrolments and non-local (out of zone) enrolments

Currently we have little (that is, only about 3 vacancies) in Years 7-10 as a whole, for non-local (out-of-zone) enrolments. We are required to maintain a small buffer of spaces for local enrolments and, demand for non-local enrolment in our school is very strong. All non-local enrolment applications are considered by a panel comprising myself, a Deputy Principal and a P&C representative. We have several students on waitlists hoping for a place to become available. Together with a strong number of enrolments for Year 7 (2019), this is a strong sign of confidence in our school.

School Uniform

Unfortunately the current state of many of our students' school uniform adherence is very concerning and, in some cases, simply unacceptable. We realise that the winter months can cause some additional stress in terms of warm clothing and getting clothes dry but many students it would seem, are simply refusing to adhere to our school uniform code. Hoodies are NOT, and never have been, part of the school uniform and should not be worn at school. So too, jumpers with large motifs, jeans, black pants for girls or boys and girls' exercise tights are all unacceptable.

Mrs Myers will be finalising a review into the school uniform later this year. Please stay tuned for further information. In the meantime, perhaps as Term 4 commences and the weather warms up, our students can present themselves in correct school uniform and proudly identify as a student of MVHS.

Beyond Bullying Review

A team of approximately 15 students, staff, parents and community youth organisation members have been working on the Beyond Bullying Review. The number of surveys returned from parents, staff and students has been outstanding. Focus groups and interviews have also been conducted in the school with students and staff. The team is meeting again on Friday 14 September and review findings and recommendations will be finalised by early Term 4.




PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Positive Education, Check-In, and The Lift project

Our school's commitment to the introduction of positive education and positive wellbeing is gaining lots of attention. As a foundation member school of the Positive Education School's Association (PESA) in NSW we recently hosted a forum attended by about 100 educators from Newcastle, Central Coast, and Upper and Lower Hunter areas — representing public, private and independent school systems.

Check-In activities are continuing to be embedded and support the Five Ways to Wellbeing framework – Connect, Keep Learning, be Active (& Healthy), Take Notice and Give. As a school we have been invited to share our positive education journey with a number of local and NSW schools. Early in term 4 I have been asked to share this with the secondary principals from across the Hunter.





Being mindful of our own health and wellbeing, 44 staff have recently embarked on a 10 week program, "The Lift Project." This is coordinated by Dr Darren Morton who is a lecturer in lifestyle medicine at Avondale College. Dr Morton presented a wellbeing training session at our School Development Day at the beginning of this term and his message certainly resonated with staff — this led to a fantastic commitment by staff to take charge of improving their own wellbeing. We are a trial school for this amazing program and look forward to sharing our insights into the program with Dr Morton in Term 4.

Year 12 Graduation

At the end of this term we will celebrate the culmination of 13 years of schooling with our beautiful Year 12 students – a huge milestone in their lives – at the Year 12 Graduation Ceremony. They are an exceptional group of young people who have so much ahead of them. We wish them well for their HSC examinations and will no doubt hear a lot more from them as they embark on their many and varied post-school destinations and pathways.

Mr Hookway and Mrs Jeffery attended Mount Panorama for the NSW State Deputy Principal's Conference hosted by Western Region.


Keynote speakers presented the latest research on Student Wellbeing and Practical Ways to Build Resilience and Growth Mindset.

ANTI-RACISM CONTACT OFFICER (ARCO)



All schools are required to have a trained Anti-Racism Contact Officer (ARCO). This officer assists parents, staff and students who have complaints regarding racism and facilitates the complaints handling process. **Mrs Anna Wells** has recently taken on this roll at MVHS.

The ARCO supports the handling of complaints of racism in a number of ways by:

- referring complaints of racism made by students against other students to executive staff members in accordance with the Behaviour Code for Students and the school's discipline and wellbeing procedures
- referring complaints of racism made by staff and community members to appropriate executive staff members
- providing advice on the complaints handling process to students, staff and community members
- supporting the complainant during the complaints handling process
- promoting anti-racism education in the school
- developing anti-racism education strategies in school planning

Other key staff that students can reach out to if they are experiencing racism includes Year Advisers, Head Teachers Wellbeing, School Counsellors and School Chaplain.

All students involved should be proud of managing to have over 200 happy customers served in such a professional manner.



3. Reward Yourself With A Treat

There are many ways to integrate a reward system into your habits so you learn how to study for exams more.

4. Teach What You Have Learned

The best way to test if you really understand something is to try to teach it to someone else.

5. Create Mental Associations

The ability to make connections is not only an easier way to remember information, but it's the fuel of creativity and intelligence. Steve Jobs famously said "Creativity is just connecting things. When you ask creative people how they did something, they feel a little guilty because they didn't really do it, they just saw something". Mind Maps are an easy way to connect ideas by creating a visual overview of different connections.

6. Draw Diagrams

Drawing diagrams will help you to visualise information which would be hard to describe. This creates a visual memory in your mind which can be recalled in an exam. You may even be asked to draw or label diagrams such as the human heart in your exam so get practicing!

7. Times New Roman is the Fastest Font to Read

Simply put – there's a reason why Times New Roman is the default font on most applications!

8. Create Flashcards for Quick Memory Buzz

Quickly test your knowledge of key concepts, definitions, quotes and formulas with flashcards.

9. Take Regular Study Breaks

When your brain is working, you need to take regular study breaks to help your brain absorb more information but also to keep you motivated and focused when you are working. Take a short break after 45-50 minutes study as your focus and concentration will become impaired after this period, anything new after 1 hour 30 minutes does not get assimilated.

10. Don't Stay Up All Night Before an Exam

Make sure to get adequate rest the nights leading up to your exams. When you sleep, your brain assimilates the information you have learned when studying so getting a good night's sleep will help you remember those pesky maths formulas you need for your exam!







Gastroenteritis	A combination of frequent loose or watery stools (diarrhoea), vomiting, fever, stomach cramps, headaches.	for at least 24 hours after diarrhoea and/or vomiting stops.
German measles (Rubella)	Often mild or no symptoms: mild fever, runny nose, swollen nodes, pink blotchy rash that lasts a short time.	for at least 4 days after the rash appears.
Glandular Fever (Mononucleosis, EBV infection)	Symptoms include fever, headache, sore throat, tiredness, swollen nodes.	unless they're feeling unwell.
Hand, Foot and Mouth Disease (HFMD)	Generally a mild illness caused by a virus, perhaps with a fever, blisters around the mouth, on the hands and feet, and perhaps the nappy area in babies.	, until all blisters have dried.
Hayfever [Allergic rhinitis] caused by allergy to pollen (from grasses, flowers and trees), dust mites, animal fur or hair, mould spores, cigarette smoke	Sneezing, a blocked or runny nose (rhinitīs), itchy eyes, nose and throat, headaches.	unless they feel unwell or are taking a medication which makes them sleepy.
Head lice or nits* (Pediculosis)	Itchy scalp, white specks stuck near the base of the hairs; lice may be found on the scalp.	while continuing to treat head lice each night. Tell the school.

Hepatitis A	Often none in young children; sudden onset of fever, loss of appetite, nausea, vomiting, jaundice (yellowing of skin and eyes), dark urine, pale stools.	for 2 weeks after first symptoms for 1 week after onset of jaundice). Contact your doctor before returning to school.	
Hepatitis B	Often no symptoms in young children. When they do occur, they can include fever, loss of appetite, nausea, vomiting, jaundice (yellowing of skin and eyes), dark urine.	if they have symptoms. Contact your doctor before returning to school. if they have a chronic infection (not the first outbreak) and no symptoms.	
Impetigo (School sores)	Small red spots change into blisters that fill up with pus and become crusted; usually on the face, hands or scalp.	until antibiotic treatment starts. Sores should be covered with watertight dressings.	
Influenza	Sudden onset fever, runny nose, sore throat, cough, muscle aches and headaches.	until well.	
Measles	Fever, tiredness, runny nose, cough and sore red eyes for a few days followed by a red blotchy rash that starts on the face and spreads down the body and lasts 4 to 7 days.	for at least 4 days after the rash appears.	
Meningococcal Disease	Sudden onset of fever and a combination of headache, neck, stiffness, nausea, vomiting, drowsiness or rash.	Seek medical attention immediately. Patient will need hospital treatment. Close contacts receive antibiotics.	
Molluscum Contagiosum	Multiple small lumps (2–5mm) on the skin that are smooth, firm and round, with dimples in the middle. In children, occur mostly on the face, trunk, upper arms and legs. Symptoms can last 6 months to 2 years.		
Mumps	Fever, swollen and tender glands around the jaw.	for 9 days after onset of swelling	
Ringworm* (tinea corporis)	Small scaly patch on the skin surrounded by a pink ring.	for 24 hours after fungal treatment has begun:	
Runny nose or common cold		unless there are other symptoms such as fever, sore throat, cough, rash or headache. Check with school.	
Scabies*	ltchy skin, worse at night. Worse around wrists, armpits, buttocks, groin and between fingers and toes.	until 24 hours after treatment has begun.	
Shigella	Diarrhoea (which may contain blood, mucus and pus), fever, stomach cramps, nausea and vomiting.	until there has not been a loose bowel motion for 24 hours. Antibiotics may be needed.	
Slapped Cheek Syndrome (Parvovirus B19 infection, fifth disease, erythema infectiosum)	Mild fever, red cheeks, itchy lace-like rash, and possibly cough, sore throat or runny nose.	as it is most infectious before the rash appears.	
Whooping Cough (Pertussis)	Starts with a running nose, followed by persistent cough that comes in bouts. Bouts maybe followed by vomiting and a whooping sound as the child gasps for air.	until the first 5 days of an antibiotic course has been completed. Unimmunised siblings may need to stay home too until treated with an antibiotic	
Worms (Threadworms, pinworms)	The main sign of threadworms is an itchy bottom. Sometimes children feel, 'out of sorts' and do not want to eat much. They may also have trouble sleeping, due to itching at night.	and tell the school as other parents will need to know to check their kids.
